Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your Presence? If I ascend to heaven, you are there; if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there. If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me; and your right hand shall hold me fast."

--Psalm 139: 7-10

Have you been watching the new series "Cosmos" on TV?

If you haven't, I recommend you tune in to see what you are missing! Week after week Neil deGrasse Tyson presents a complex weave of history, theory, and current scientific discoveries richly illustrated with inspiring computer-generated graphics. After every episode of "Cosmos" I come away with a deeper sense of wonder and appreciation of the magnitude and the mystery of the cosmos—a sense of wonder and appreciation that I share with Dr. Tyson.

In a recent article in popular Science magazine, Dr. Tyson was asked "what incredible thing will we see in our lifetime?", and his answer was: "I think that we will know whether or not there's life on planets other than Earth." The idea that we are not alone in the cosmos is an exciting one indeed, but as a person of faith I had already found my answer to that question some time ago-- although it had nothing to do with astrophysics or proof of extraterrestrial life. I found my answer to the question "are we alone?" when I experienced a connection to a Higher Power that people of faith call God. The good news that there may be life other than ours in the cosmos is actually old news for people of faith, who are already living on the far side of a simultaneously new and very old encounter with a Presence who leaves us convinced that indeed we are not alone!

Unfortunately, one thing I suspect (if Dr. Tyson is correct in his prediction) is that the excitement of science discovering "we are not alone" will change from good news to old news relatively quickly. The stirring of our collective imaginations at this discovery will lessen over time; our renewed sense of wonder and thankful marveling will fade all too quickly; our renewed resolve to work for a better world (now "universe") will be consumed by other cares. So often that is also the case in our lives of faith. What amazes me in my own self-examination is that I can so clearly feel that "I am not alone"—clearly feel the love and guidance of a Power beyond myself, and sense the utter good intent of that Power toward me— and yet I can still remain unmoved, unchanged, hardened, and locked into the same dysfunctions which seem to make a mockery of this Power's good intent. In orthodox terms we call this the power of sin; in more existential terms we might simply call it our human predilection toward inertia and life-robbing beliefs and behaviors. However you label it, it is real--and for most people of faith, it is our constant companion and challenge in life.

And yet even as we do not live into the Good News that "we are not alone"... the Good News remains. The Good News remains that the God who encountered our flawed human ancestors and cared for them is also at work in our time and place. The Good News remains that we are not forgotten by God, even though we may forget God. The Good News remains that we are not cosmic orphans, accidents of an accidental universe who are destined to wink out like burnt out stars. We are heirs of the Good News of a GRACE that is eternal, cosmic, unshakeable...ever and always *for us*. To live in the light of that Good News is the essence of a life of faith here on planet Earth—and if there is life on other planets, that will be the essence of the Good News there as well.

I hope you have a chance to tune into "Cosmos" some Sunday evening, and if you do I hope you experience a renewal of your sense of wonder at the mystery which brings forth worlds without end. More importantly, I hope you take time to tune into your connection to the Mystery we call God, so that your faith may be strengthened and renewed—your walk with the Mystery and Power who knows you, loves you, guides you, and sustains you now, and forever. Northwestern Association Annual Meeting

The day was gray and rainy, but the news was good when the NW Association had its annual meeting at the 1st Congregational United Church of Christ in Fort Dodge April 26. Both the state and association budgets are using black ink. As Conference Minister Rich Pleva said in his report, "2013 was a good year for OCWM (Our Church's Wider Mission) income. Thanks to your faithfulness and generosity we (slightly) exceeded our goal for this year. God bless you! We work very hard to use your gifts faithfully and frugally."

NW Association treasurer Dorothy Denny reported that we have 4,800 members in the 42 churches in our section of the state. Each church pays \$3 per member in its congregation, for projected 2014-2015 income of \$14,400. Largest expenses approved were for Committee on Ministry mileage, youth events, and OCWM to conference. I'd be happy to share the whole budget with you. Several attendees thanked our church in Webster City for supplying two members to the COM: Joyce Gelhaus and Rev. Blaufuss.

Rev. Brigit Stevens, associate conference minister and staff person for the NW Association, presented a program called For the Love of It. about Dewitt Jones, a National Geographic photographer and motivational speaker. Jones recommends listing 5 things that bring you joy, that fill your cup, and remind yourself of them daily. If you can't do them often, act as if you can; it changes the way you look at life and you face the day with gratitude.

Stevens is available to meet with churches' leadership teams and would rather come before there are problems. She said a struggle at a church isn't about the color of the carpet; it's underlying issues and relationships.

The 2015 annual meeting of the Northwestern Association will be on April 25 at the Community UCC in Castana (about 130 miles from Webster City).

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by the Moderator, Verna Bierle. Pastor Craig Blaufuss opened with a meditation and prayer. The minutes of last meeting and board and committee reports were open for review and discussion. Ginnie Veach asked that a correction to the March minutes be made. The Mission Board report was made by Ginnie Veach. Worship Board did not have a report but will be meeting soon. Holly did report that there would not be a Saturday night service in April and they would discuss future Saturday night services at their next meeting. The Trustees will meet on Thursday morning with Schlotfeldt Engineering to go over the plans that they have ready. They will also have a "ball park" figure as to the cost of the renovation project. Nancy Sheldon reported that Evangelism had just met and there would be two pot luck suppers this summer. One is June 15 and the other is July 13 and they would be at Briggs Woods in the Barn. Dale Olson reported that Finance will be reviewing the scholarship application form at their next meeting. Staff/ Parish reported that the church staff has been assigned a committee member to work with. Vicki reported that Christian Ed will be very busy the next couple of months. Her full report was printed for all to review. Women's Fellowship has a full report printed for review and they are also very busy the next couple of months. Nancy moved to accept all of the reports and Holly seconded the motion. Motion passed.

The Pastor's report was given by Craig. He talked about the Maundy Thursday Service and the Easter morning activities and services. He also reported that summer lunches would be happening again this summer and he would have more details soon, but he thought we would have a week to help like last year. The Ministerial Association would like to see Warm Hearts, Warm Hands again this year. Black Hills energy will help with this but will not be in charge. A father of one of our young Sunday School members has a large garden space on Wall Street. He has offered anyone in our congregation the use of some of this space for the watering fee of \$10.00. Craig will put something in the newsletter about the garden space. He also reported that we are still collecting children's books.

Treasurer Luverne Bierle reported that the March offering total was \$ 14,673.00 and the expenses were \$ 19,605.12. Luverne made a motion that the report be put to audit. Dalene seconded. Motion passed.

The Northwest Association Spring Meeting will be in Ft Dodge on April 26, 2014. Marjorie Groves, Rev Craig and Vicki Blaufuss will attend.

The Stephen Ministries had a great retreat on Saturday and all of the ministers are now paired up with someone.

It was agreed that the Cabinet would serve coffee after church on April 13 if no one else has signed up with the church office. Everyone agreed on what they would bring.

Verna asked if the church audit had been done; no report has been submitted. She said that she would check to see if it was done or not.

Myra reported that the pedal board for the organ had been ordered and would probably arrive sometime in July. Cost would be about \$ 5,300.00. The Finance Board has agreed to see that this bill is paid and then when the Cliff Doty CD comes due if we need to put the money back in the general fund that would happen.

The next meeting will be May 13, 2014.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 pm.

Reports of Pastor and Committees:

Pastor's Report: Thanked for the wonderful coffee following worship on his birthday, March 16th, and to those who read parts for One Great Hour of Sharing on March 30th. A drama will be part of the Maundy Thursday evening service. It is titled "At the Foot of the Cross" with short monologues offered by characters who were present at Jesus' crucifixion. On Easter Sunday there will be a "Son-Rise" service at 8:30 am and a traditional Easter Service at 10:30 with pew communion served. At the pastor's retreat held in Newton, IA, he heard from Rev. Ben Guess about the new Vision plan of the UCC. The NW Association CoM licensed 12 clergy at a special gathering on March 15th at Primghar. The subcommittee on the CoM will meet with the pastors and council of Jewell UCC on Tuesday, April 29th. The Spring Association meeting for the NW Association will be held at First Congregational UCC in Fort Dodge on Saturday April 26th. The adult class continues their study of healing; they have finished studying Theta Healing. An overflow crowd heard Kathy Getting give a presentation on the issues surrounding the legalization of medical marijuana. Fifteen KLAB students visited the Almost Home animal shelter in March. They will be studying bible stories related to Holy Week until Easter. The last day of KLAB will be May 14th; on May 16th there will be a celebratory lock-in at the church for all KLAB kids. No adult or children's Sunday School will be held on Easter Sunday, but there will be Easter activities for the kids beginning at 9:00 am and an Easter breakfast at 9:30. Ten Stephen Ministers are matched with care receivers. After the Grief Support group finished their series of meetings, they held a wrap-up meeting to evaluate the process and make improvements. The group held a morning retreat on April 5 beginning with a discussion on grief and death led by Bob Erickson followed by devotions and lunch at the church. There will be no more Stephen ministry meetings in April. The WCMA is looking for an organization to resurrect Warm Hearts Warm Homes in Webster City as Black Hills Energy is no longer involved. UDMO has approached the WCMA about taking over the Angel tree program. This would entail a church or churches hosting the trees and storing the gifts; UDMO will continue to screen families for eligibility. Several 10'x20' garden plots on Wall Street are available to church members who would like to garden. There is no cost to use the ground, and only a \$10 charge to provide water during the growing season. Tilling and tools are available at a very small cost. Contact the minister if you are interested.

Christian Education: March 19th meeting: Chairperson elect is Todd Sonsalla and Vicki Blaufuss is the cabinet rep elect. The board will be meeting the first Wednesday of the month. The board reviewed the Saturday evening Christian education program for children, and has elected to discontinue offering it in the future. Plans were made for Holy Week: a "praise chain" will be made and put out on Easter Sunday, will host an Easter breakfast following the "Son-Rise" service and the Easter activities. Graduation Sunday will be May 11th with Livia Oberender being the only graduate. Jane Klaver will order the cake, pick up the flower and Leah

will purchase the gift. A list of babies who have not received storybooks when they were baptized is needed. Also a list of 2nd graders who have not received Bibles and confirmation students (8th and 9th graders) who have not received Bibles is needed. Postcards will be made by inkjet to send to the children of the church for special occasions such as birthday, rally day and "missing you." Confirmation this year will be Dillon, Luke, Tyler? Kayla? and Jackson. KLAB is in need of help next year as Pastor Craig will be doing confirmation. ALL help is welcomed. We are also in need of teachers that have the heart to work with children. VBS will be at Asbury from July 28th to August 1st, from 4:30 to 7:15 pm. Any help would be appreciated. April 2nd meeting: The committee decided to have a Children's Sabbath the last day of Sunday school which will be May 18th. Those children going to a higher class will receive a Certificate which will be made at the church. We will also be presenting Bibles to any child that will be entering the 2nd and 3rd grade. Graduation Sunday will be May 11th. Vicki and Craig will bring nuts and mints, and Jane and Leah Maass will take care of the cake, flower and gift. The Sunday school curriculum was discussed. Wil Groves and Leah will check the downstairs resources. Todd will check what is available in Des Moines. It was decided to remove the couch from Leah's classroom per her request as it is worn and dirty. Wil will remove it. The foosball table in the teen class room was also discussed. Wil is going to ask the quilters to make a cover for it. Todd and Katie Sonsalla will be returning this fall to teach the high school class. They will use the Devozine materials. Vicki and Todd will prepare the room for next fall, including checking what TV's no longer work and should be removed. Vicki will make a list of youth to contact for next year's classes. Wil and Craig will supervise the KLAB May 14th, lock-in but are still in need of a female to help. The board has invited Brandon Arkland, grandson of Bruce and Sharon Perry, to be included in the graduation service on May 11th, 2014. The next CE meeting will be May 7th 2014 at 7:00 pm.

Pastor Craig requested vacation time from June 23-30. This will include one Sunday June 29th. The board voted to approve this request. The next meeting will be June 4th at 5:15 pm.

Gayle Olson and Karin Yungclas presented the program for our fellowship at the Women's Lenten Luncheon. The May dinner date is May 21, 2014 at 5:30 pm. Assignments are: decorations and set up-Mayflower; Hostess-Providence; Program-Joy Fopma (Human Trafficking). Gayle Olson is purchasing three books that Joy Fopma has suggested that we read before her program, if interested. The birthday party at the care centers will be Tuesday, May 13th. At 1:00 pm will be at Southfield and at 2:00 pm at Crestview. Each circle needs to provide 1 worker and 2 dozen cookies. The care centers will provide the drinks. Dalene, Ginnie Veach, Sharon Perry are coordinating. This will be a salad and sandwich luncheon with a \$10 per person charge. Wilma Reinsel will call for salad donations; dessert will be made the night before by the committee; a request for a few workers to help make sandwiches in the morning; Haystack will set tables and decorate.
