On June 25, 1957, four Protestant denominations—Evangelical, Reformed, Congregational, and Christian--formally merged and became the United Church of Christ. As we have just passed the 59th anniversary of the union which created our parent denomination, it seems to me that it is a good idea to again remind ourselves of some things about our denomination that we tend to forget.

There *is* something special about the UCC...there is something *different* about our parent denomination that is unique to the Christian family, at least in America...and that difference can be summed up in one word: "Freedom." The United Church of Christ, perhaps more so than any other mainline Christian denomination in the country, claims to take seriously the words from the 8th chapter in the Gospel of John, words that proclaim: "If the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." The freedom spoken of by Jesus in John's Gospel points to the freedom we receive as disciples following in the way of Jesus. Like grace, that freedom is a gift from God that enables us to be authentic seekers of God and God's purposes for our lives, rather than being reduced to parrots who are taught, or forced, to mimic other people's truths. That freedom also opens us to the possibility of acting with integrity in response to the summons of the Still-Speaking God, rather than following someone else's conformist script of behavior that is "acceptable" to them. Do you remember the words of Pastor John Robinson to the Pilgrims, as they were getting ready to sail to the New World in 1620? "God has yet more light and truth to break forth from his holy word." I hope when you hear those words you realize that you are hearing what is best about the UCC, for the UCC is a denomination with a strong message of empowerment for *all* people, for that is what true freedom can do—it empowers people.

The freedom we receive as disciples of Jesus is the very lifeblood of the UCC—it is woven into the very fabric of our denomination. Let me briefly point out some of the freedoms that are part and parcel of our denomination—freedoms that do make us unique.

Jesus is our only "boss" in the UCC. This congregation has autonomy: we make all of our decisions-including whether to support the conference and the national office through our OCWM giving! We ratify our
own constitution; we elect our own officers to manage the affairs of this congregation; we call and dismiss our
own pastors. This congregation can even choose to leave the UCC, and we know that some churches have
chosen to use that freedom! The conference and national office of the UCC may speak to us, but they do not
speak for us unless we choose to listen to them, and they in turn also have the freedom to listen (or not) to
our voice. What binds us together as one people is covenant—the acknowledgement that we belong together
and should strive to listen to each other and take each other seriously—even when we don't always agree
with each other.

We have theological freedom in the UCC. One of the most important phrases heard in the UCC is this: "the testimonies of our ancestors' faith are not the tests of ours." This denomination welcomes searching spirits and requires no litmus tests of faith in order to belong to it. You can be theologically conservative, moderate, or liberal and still be a part of the UCC! This freedom has special importance to me because it allows me the freedom to think and understand outside the box of conventional belief, as my conscience and search for truth and meaning may lead me. And I can say with honesty that this is the only Christian denomination I would care to serve--precisely because of that theological freedom.

You have the freedom to witness and serve in the UCC as you feel led by God to do so. Did you know that in 1785 the Congregationalists ordained Lemual Haynes, the first African American pastor to be ordained by a Protestant denomination? Did you know that in 1853 Antoinette Brown was the first woman ordained

since New Testament times—also by Congregationalists? Did you know that in 1972 the Golden Gate Association of the UCC ordained the first openly gay person as a minister in a mainline Protestant denomination: the Rev. William Johnson? There is a new initiative in the UCC called "Multiple Paths to Ordination" which offers ordained ministerial standing to people who may not be able to attend seminary, yet have the gifts and life experience to be fine ministers nonetheless. In the UCC, *all* of us, not some of us, are called to minister and serve in the name of Jesus.

These are some of the freedoms we enjoy as UCC members that we often take for granted--freedoms that I believe help define who we are as a people of faith. Yet I am afraid that there is a very real possibility that we will not make it to our Centennial year, and whether we make it or not *is really up to us*.

If we fixate on the things about the UCC that we object to or disagree with to the exclusion of all else, we will rob this denomination of its lifeblood of energy and funding.

If we forget to inform ourselves, and our children, about the UCC, we will allow it to atrophy because of a lack of interest on our parts.

If we do not support the programs and ministry of the wider church, then we risk becoming an island to ourselves, which will not only diminish the vitality of our denomination, but our vitality as well. The wider church reminds us that there is more to our Christian life than attending First Congregational in Webster City. That is a reminder that we all need to hear.

Friends, the heart of the Good News is summed up well by Paul in his letter to the Galatians, and surely it is also the heart and soul of the United Church of Christ as well: "Now that faith has come we are no longer subject to a 'baby-sitter', for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ, you have clothed yourself with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male or female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

May we celebrate the Good News of our freedom in Christ, and may we celebrate the life of our denomination, whose foundation rests on the great gift of this freedom!

ReCharge 2014

You always learn tons at the annual gathering of the Iowa Conference UCC. This year's ReCharge – seminars, speakers, worship, fellowship – was in Ames, June 6-7. Thank you for letting me represent our church! *Marjorie Groves*, Lay Delegate

Here's advice I learned at the seminar on making a church more welcoming, led by Associate Conference Minister Jonna Jensen.

Most people find a church through the website, so be sure the schedule and phone numbers are up to date. Include photos of people – especially children – during worship. People want to know if they have to dress up. A photo of the children's message shows that it's ok for kids to wear tee shirts and shorts.

Have signs to show parking. Designate handicap parking. Put a parking sign on our vacant lot; this can be vital for weddings and funerals. Make it obvious which church door to use and have big signs with arrow to indicate the sanctuary, fellowship hall, East Chapel, restroom. Mark the handicap accessible door!

It's a great idea on baptism, children's program Sundays and Easter to have ushers or greeters outside or at the main doors – not just inside the sanctuary – to welcome and to tell new attenders where the sanctuary, restrooms and nursery are.

Do not say things like "Well, I haven't seen you for a while." But, also, don't fall all over returning folks like a duck on a June bug (as Jonna says).

Wear your nametag if you're comfortable with it but don't make newcomers wear one and don't make them stand up during the service to introduce themselves.

Mention to folks with youngsters that, if they're interested, we have a nursery and children can go there after the children's message. Be sure to mention that children are welcome to take communion, if parents wish.

Ushers can suggest where a new person might want to sit, e.g., near the back (wise on communion Sundays), near other people with children or near outgoing folks.

Create a church code sheet for the pew pocket or to put in the bulletin. A code sheet defines words we use, e.g., bulletin, sanctuary, narthex, message, intinction, passing of the peace, doxology, chancel, hymn, elements, introit, offering.

Recruit friendly church members to invite newcomers to coffee time, stand with them in line and sit with them at a table.

1st Congregational UCC Preservation/ Renovation Survey Report—July 1, 2014

The Congregation: Thank you for completing the Preservation/ Renovation Survey back in 2013! You gave the Evangelism Survey Task Force excellent guidance and advice. We all realize that change takes time and we are making progress towards the goals you gave us to work on as a whole congregation. We value each of your suggestions and want to share the total report with you. If something seems like a project you could handle yourself, please let the cabinet know of your plans.

The Survey Task Force included: Diane Vasquez, LaVonne Osmundson, Laurie Epps, Wilma Reinsel, Cindy Henning, Vicki Blaufuss, Karin and Al Yungclas, Margy Wood, Dale Olson, Bruce Perry, and Pastor Craig Blaufuss. 39 members of the church responded to the survey and the Survey Task Force met for 3 months to analyze each comment the congregation gave.

The conclusions/ recommendations include:

1. Hospitality Committee: Greeters need to be outside/ or right inside both entrances of church. (Not in Sanctuary.) Greeters need to be trained. When new persons come into the church entrance by elevator, there is no sign that shows where sanctuary is and

visitors are left to wander around trying to find the church service. Ushers are inside sanctuary to help people find seats...greeters need to be where you first enter the church. Members should greet new folks or ones we haven't seen for a while. Ask visitors to introduce themselves (if ok with visitor) at start of service during announcement time. Give welcome bags to new visitors.

- 2. <u>Women's Fellowship:</u> Need better signage in kitchen to know where to find things—and to be able to put them away in proper places.
- 3. Congregation Members:
- a. Need to clean out all closets and cabinets throughout church. This costs nothing and would be worth so much to the overall organization of the church.
- b. All rooms need to be cleaned out and get rid of things we don't need. Get rid of old, outdated furniture. Ask for donations of new/ or good used furniture for different areas.
- c. Move brochure rack and suggestion box from outside Pastor's office. With internet available, most information is available there!
- 4. Christian Education:
- a. Need a volunteer to be in charge of library...someone willing to sort through books and get rid of old ones. This would help de-clutter library area. Volunteer librarian needs to be in charge of all books in the church. Keep people informed of new books received for library. Keep computer and printer running if one is purchased for library.
- b. Need a volunteer to be in charge of nursery...someone willing to see that nursery is kept clean for infants and small children. The Nursery Volunteer would keep broken toys sorted out, disinfect toys, create bulletin boards for nursery, set up rules for safety of caring for our children in the nursery. The Volunteer would find a television with DVD capability to assist nursery volunteers in providing care for our children.
- 5. Worship Committee:
- a. We need more activities with other churches. Do more things to bring members from community into our church. When we partner with other churches for activities, why do we always go to their church and not ours?
- b. Need Saturday night church service with contemporary music to attract young families.
- 6. Personnel, Cabinet, Christian Education:
- a. Hire a Youth Staff Person to help Pastor Craig reach younger families and build up Sunday school. We need to expand our young family programs.

Webster City, Iowa Cabinet Meeting – June 10, 2014

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by the Moderator, Verna Bierle. Pastor Craig Blaufuss opened with a meditation and prayer. Luverne Bierle moved and Vicki Blaufuss seconded to accept the minutes of the May 13 cabinet meeting. Motion carried. The board and committee reports were open for discussion and review. A discussion was held on the recent change of our procedure of making announcements at the beginning of the church service. The Mission Board in particular felt that their projects were not getting the emphasis that is needed for the projects to be successful. Dalene Schlitter moved that individuals can make their own announcements but they should be brief, only on church matters and that the announcer be up front. Vicki seconded. Motion carried. Vicki moved and Dalene seconded to accept the reports of the boards and committees. Motion carried, Luverne Bierle reported the following in the Treasurer's Report: May 31, 2014 offering-\$9,736.21: May 31, 2014 expenses -\$17,458.45. Luverne moved and Joyce Gelhaus seconded to put the report to audit. Luverne expressed his concern on the spread between the offering and expenses. Under pending business Joyce brought us up to date on the possible church renovation. Dalene moved and Vicki seconded that the church consult with an attorney to see if anything has to be done on an old debt collection problem on some ink cartridges that the church did not purchase. Motion carried. Pastor Craig asked for help in researching a "safe church policy". Dalene Schlitter, Verna Bierle and Mary Van Diest offered to help research this matter. Dalene moved and Ginnie Veach seconded that we transfer the \$20,000 Covil Fund, plus \$209.81 in interest to the Endowment Fund. Motion carried. It was also noted that the audit report for the year 2013 has not been done. There will not be a meeting in July.

Reports of Pastor, Boards and Committees

Pastor's Report: Promotion Sunday and Children's Sabbath was held on May 18th. Certificates of participation for Sunday School and KLAB were handed out, teachers acknowledged, and Bibles presented to our young people. The next Second Saturday service will be June 14th. On Sunday, June 22nd, Floyd Hammer and Kathy Hamilton, the founders of Outreach Inc. and Kids Against Hunger will speak in worship of their experiences working in Africa. On Sunday June 29th, Rev .Charles Smith will fill the pulpit while Pastor Craig is on a week's vacation in Burlington and he will preach in his home church on that day. He attended the Periodic Support Consultation on June 9th at Klemme. On June 6-7 he attended the lowa Conference RECHARGE event. The keynote speaker, Krista Tippett, urged churches to take up their calling to be

sanctuaries for civil discourse where people can have serious and respectful discussions of vital issues. He attended a discussion on copyright issues and learned that churches actually own the rights to all work their pastor produces. He also attended a session that offered some very creative ideas for incorporating prayer in youth programming through art, music and movement. KLAB had an overnight lock-in at the church on May 16th for 13 kids. Thanks to Wil Groves, Alexis Tudor and her friend Olynca for chaperoning. A KLAB session was held on June 3rd, to make giant "tools" for VBS props. The plan is to meet about every 2 weeks during the summer: the next KLAB event will be at 5:00 pm on Tuesday, June 17, playing Frisbee golf at Brewer Creek Park. For the joint VBS program Linda Lahr will MC the gathering times, Pastor Craig will lead games, Don Bruner will lead the singing, Al Yungclas will help with skits and Alexis Tudor will help as needed. VBS will be held at Asbury Methodist from 4:30-7:15 pm, July 28th-Aug. 1st. The Grief Support group scheduled to begin June 1st has been cancelled due to no participants enrolling. The next support group will begin Sept. 7th.

Christian Ed Board: Graduates Livia Oberender and Brandon Arkland were honored on Graduation Sunday, May 11th. The couches and coffee table in the upstairs teen room are to be removed. It was suggested that the couches in Pastor's office be brought up to the teen room and new couches purchased for the pastor's office. Wil Groves will be asked to remove these. This room needs to be cleaned after the furniture is removed. The costumes still remain in the hall; they need to be removed. Todd Sonsalla presented a job description for a Christian Ed Director. It will be reviewed by the Pastor. Then to the Staff/Parrish Committee and then to the Finance Committee. The youth will be asked who is willing to be candle lighters starting in the fall. A list will be made up and placed in the newsletter and bulletin. Rally Day will be held on Sept. 7th, starting at 9:00 am in the empty lot with games as fish pond, face painting, cup cake walk, water balloons and a dunk tank. There will be bingo for the adults who wish to participate after lunch. A pot luck will be planned with the CE Board providing drinks. Final plans will be done at the next meeting. Refer to Pastor's Report on the KLAB activities. All Sunday school classes will start next fall at 9:15 am. The teachers need to be on time so as not to have youth running through the church. Leah Maass and Wil Groves are still checking on a new curriculum for this fall. Todd requested that the upstairs classrooms be painted. He stated that the teens are willing to help. He presented an average age chart to the board to show that we need to update the church so we can attract new members. A discussion was held regarding the books on the book shelves.
