"But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous." -- Matthew 5:44-45

Have you ever won a fight?

I remember a time when I got into a real fight. I was about 12, and it erupted near a playground one afternoon after school. I guess you could say that I "won" (no one was seriously hurt—mostly a lot of shoving), but I remember going home and feeling like anything but a winner. Maybe it was the adrenaline in my bloodstream that was causing my agitation, but there was a sickening feeling in my gut and my heart that nothing had been solved at all with our brawl; instead I now had to wonder what would happen next between us. Would this fight escalate our feud, which up to that moment had only been a "war of words?" Would he bring some friends along with him the next time, and even the score? Would he vandalize our house? Would I have trouble with him in school?

Now by age 12 I had heard a hundred adults say "fighting doesn't solve anything," but that day I experienced the truth of those words for myself, for I realized our fight had exacerbated the conflict between us and fueled a fire that would only burn hotter than ever. And sadly, we see this truth being played out constantly all around us —from the fights between family members leading to a murder in our own town... to the fights we are witnessing in Iraq, Afghanistan, Gaza, Syria, Ukraine, and yes, even Ferguson, Missouri. All of this fighting has frankly solved little, if anything; all of this fighting has been justified in the name of "victory"; all of this fighting has only stoked more fuel on a worldwide firestorm of violence which shows no signs of burning out any time soon. And the few voices left who cry out "violence doesn't solve anything" are generally disregarded, ridiculed, even silenced...because *nearly everyone is convinced that their fight is justified, and that it can be won.*

We Christians find ourselves in the difficult situation of following a world religious leader who was both opposed to violence and a victim of violence. Jesus was one of the few voices in his day who cried out against violence, saying in essence "fighting doesn't solve anything!" ...and we know the horrible way he was silenced by the authorities of his day. His message and the cross are a constant reminder to us of how costly it can be when a non-violent message meets a very violent world...and all of us must negotiate the costs we are willing to bear as we follow Jesus' teachings on non-violence. But one thing seems clear to me: all of humanity needs to face the difficult truth that fighting rarely resolves human differences, but only prolongs and feeds intensifying cycles of attack and retaliation—whether the fighting is happening in our families, our cities, or in foreign lands. We need to choose a different answer to our disagreements other than resorting to violence in all of its forms; we need to choose a different way to respond to aggression, insults, and injuries other than returning those violations back upon the aggressor in larger and larger doses.

In this charged climate of worldwide violence where every fight is seen as justifiable and winnable, every non-violent act and thought counts. Yes, pray for peace (we've certainly heard that suggestion enough!) but more importantly, ACT for peace. As the scriptures say, do not render evil for evil; do not allow yourself to get caught up in fights of any kind—even those on social media. Speak and live your truths as your conscience dictates, but relinquish the Crusader mentality that insists you must vanquish those who oppose your beliefs and your values. Realize that all—even those you most despise—are loved no less by God than you. And believe, as Jesus taught, that the only fight worth winning—and indeed the only fight capable of being truly "won"--is the fight within you to let love guide your response to all others' actions...rather than hatred, the desire to attack, and the thirst for revenge. —Pastor Craig

WARM HEARTS WARM HOMES WINTER WEATHERIZATION 2014

Central Iowa RSVP, in partnership with a number of community organizations, will be coordinating the Warm Hearts Warm Homes Winter Weatherization Program in Hamilton County for 2014.* We have set the date for winterizing homes for Nov. 15, 2014, from 8:30 to noon. A task force is being established to take the necessary steps of action to have a successful weatherization program. Members of the task force will assume particular responsibilities, and report their progress to the group on a monthly basis.

Task Force Areas of Responsibility:

- Publicity—KQWC, Daily Freeman-Journal, City Newsletter, Chamber Newsletter
- Challenging civic groups, churches, businesses, banks to set up teams of volunteers (3-4 people plus one team leader)
- Establishing list of teams of volunteers (need 15 teams)
- Determining eligibility of applicants (goal of serving 30 households)

- Scheduling audits of homes, assigning auditors to visit homes
- Assigning teams to homes
- Communicating with team leaders for training and preparation

Your help is needed to organize the WHWH Winter Weatherization Program, and to promote the program as a worthwhile effort for the whole community. Will you give some of your time to ensure the success of this program? Your participation would be greatly appreciated. Please let me know if you are willing to be on the task force. The first task

force meeting will be held in mid-August.

REMINDER BOARD

- Glue one side of the Velcro to the erasable pen and one side to the frame.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 pm by the Moderator Verna Bierle. Pastor Craig Blaufuss opened with a meditation and prayer. The minutes of the previous Cabinet meeting were approved as printed.

Reports of Pastor, Boards and Committees:

The board and committee reports were open for discussion and review. Holly Riemenschneider, reporting for **Worship**, stated that the music videos were well received at the Saturday night service.

The Worship Board will be reviewing how often Saturday night services occur. Vicki Blaufuss, **Education**, reminded us of Rally Day on September 7th. Details under Education report. Tom Riemenschneider, Trustees, reported that work was progressing on the air conditioning system. He stated that final renovation plans had just been received from Schlotfeldt Engineering. After the trustees review the plans, they will be presenting it to the cabinet and congregation for consideration. Myra Maxon, organist, reported that the new pedal board had been installed on the organ that day. Dalene Schlitter moved, Holly Riemenschneider seconded that the old pedal board could be given to the organ installer: motion carried upon vote. Dalene Schlitter, Staff/Parish, reported that they had approved vacations for Michele Omvig and Pastor Craig. Ginnie Veach, Mission, highlighted their activities. Details under Mission report. Duane Vavroch, from **Finance**, stated that boards should begin preparing their proposed 2015 budgets and turn into the church office by September 14. He reminded us that we are behind in giving this year so that we should prepare for zero growth in the budget. Luverne Bierle, **Treasurer**, reported that \$5,000 was taken out of a money market in May to cover expenses, followed by \$10,000 in June. The money market currently has about \$82,000 in it but \$70,000 is designated for the building fund. He reported for June 30, 2014 the offering was \$12,250.88 and June 30, 2014 expenses were \$21,684.04. He also reported that the July 31, 2014 offering was \$17,945.00 and July 31, 2014 expenses were \$16,273.90. Luverne moved and Duane Vavroch seconded that these be put to audit. Motion carried. Joyce Gelhaus, Women's Fellowship Chair, stated that the next Executive Board meeting would be Tuesday September 2 at 5:00 pm. Duane Vavroch moved and Holly Riemenschneider seconded that all board and committee reports be accepted. Motion carried upon vote.

Minutes of above cabinet meeting were taken by clerk pro tem, Myra Maxon.

Reports of Pastor, Boards and Committees: Pastor's Report:

We are now incorporating more music "videos" with a more contemporary style at the Saturday Services. Worship service was led on June 22nd by Outreach Inc. workers Frank Hammer and Kathy Hamilton. On June 14th we commissioned our Romanian Mission trip participants who in turn led our worship service on August 3rd. Scholarship Sunday was held during the August 9th service. Care Center worship services were held on June 22nd and August 10th Thanks to Cindy Henning for making the large yellow banner that announces to the public when our Second Saturday Service will be held. The church again provided leadership for the summer lunch program and donated 80% of the books distributed to the children. As part of my work with RSVP, we are trying to resurrect the Warm Hearts Warm Homes weatherization program, with a goal of serving 30 low income/disabled households. Volunteers are needed to help organize the event and to be team members. The date for the weatherization will be Saturday, November 15th 9:00-12:00 am. Joined forces with Asbury UMC for the "Workshop of Wonders" VBS held July 28-Aug. 1. Attendance was down this year but it was still a good week of fun, learning, and interaction with the children. Special events were held this summer to keep the momentum going with KLAB. They made decorations for VBS, played Frisbee Golf at Brewer Creek Shelter, had a wiener roast and a pool party at the Americann.

Mission Board:

From their July 3rd meeting reported the following: The Ice Cream Social made \$935; Relay for Life raised \$1,026; paper collection for UDMO will continue through end of July at which time Gayle Olson will see that it gets delivered; Ginnie Veach is in charge for the July 30th Beacon of Hope meal; Gayle will look into lining something up in August for Kids Against Hunger. From their August 7th meeting reported the following: Lorraine McCoskey will check with the WIC program at Public Health to see if they will collaborate with us in getting books to young children under the UCC Literacy Initiative; 40 men were served in July at Beacon of Hope; the men are now making and selling jewelry; Karin Yungclas will captain the September Beacon of Hope meal; for Warm Hearts/Warm Homes need at least one team (4-5 people) from our church. Next meeting will be September 4, 5:00 pm.

Trustees:

The air exchanger in the bell tower needs to be replaced. Motion made by Les Ploeger and seconded by Bruce Perry to purchase a new air exchanger for around \$11,850. Motion carried. Funds are available for the air exchanger. Will check with Mark Trueblood if he knows anyone to take care of the bat dung in the bell tower. The final renovation plans have been received from Schlotfeldt Engineering. He gave us an estimate for the project and what his charge will be. Gretchen Bruner and Les Ploeger had questions about the two estimates for carpet. They will contact both places on their questions and get new estimates. Tom had an estimate on the wood graining.

Christian Ed:

Rally Day will be September 7th starting at 9:15 am in the empty lot across from the church with games for all ages. A potluck will follow worship with the church providing the drinks. Some of the games include face painting, fish pond, cupcake walk and bingo after the pot luck and a dunk tank with water balloons. Vicki will obtain the prizes for rally day. All Sunday school classes will start at 9:15 am this fall. Senior High will be on Wednesday night from 5:00 until 6:00 with Todd and Katie Sonsalla teaching this group, using the Devo materials. The broken couch in the teen room will be removed. Leah

stated she had several chairs to replace the couch. Candle lighters will be from 4th to 8th grade students. As Leah teaches this age group, she will make a list, train and provide a list to the office to be placed in the bulletin weekly. Verna Weieneth has offered to help with KLAB by setting out the treats. KLAB will start September 10th from 3:30 -5:00. Helpers include Wil Groves, Al Maxon, Nancy Shelton when she is able, Leah to possibly do a cooking component. Todd stated he would ask his mother to help with crafts. Meals 'n' More will be the first Wednesday of each month. A signup sheet will be placed on the bulletin board. Teachers for this coming year are: Jenna Short--Pre-K thru Kindergarten; Laurie Epps—1st-3rd; Leah Maass-- 4th-8th; with Todd and Katie Sonsalla teaching the teens. Leah will check with the other teachers to see if they would like to follow the book that she uses. On Sunday mornings, the teachers will bring the students to the sanctuary at 9:50 am for singing with Don Bruner or Katie Sonsalla. A Christian Ed director has been tabled at this time.

Next cabinet meeting: Tuesday, September 9th at 7:00 pm.

Moved by Luverne Bierle with a second by Holly Riemenschneider that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried upon vote. Meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm.
