"...And whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward." –Matt. 10:42

Recently I was in Fort Dodge getting my tires rotated, and I stopped to get trash bags at Aldi's on the way home. While I was standing in the checkout line, I noticed a couple attempting to purchase 2 loaves of bread and a half gallon of milk. The checker rang up the items, and the man immediately grabbed them from the cart and hurried out the door while the woman produced a debit card and swiped to pay. The cashier paused while staring at her screen, and then without a word swiveled the smaller customer screen toward the woman and pointed to what was written there. It wasn't hard to guess what it said, since the woman let out a gasp, moaned, and hurriedly left the store. Now if you have ever shopped at Aldi's, you know that declined debit cards aren't that rare of an occurrence (it has happened to me). Yet whether it is because of inept management of one's debit account (that's me) or genuine poverty, it inevitably leads to embarrassment for the customer and inconvenience to those in line. But yesterday it was different. The checker sat silently staring into space, wondering if they were going to return with the bread and milk, when the man in front of me leaned over and asked her, "How much was it?"

"Three dollars and eighty-one cents," she replied, and hearing this, the man handed her a twenty and said, "I'll pay for it." The checker raised an eyebrow, and asked, "Are you sure?" to which the man curtly replied "Yes"...and so the checker completed the transaction, made change for the twenty, and asked him if he wanted the receipt. "No thanks," was all he said as he waited for her to ring his sale, and after paying for his goods he hurried from the store. I then watched her ring up my sale, and after paying for it I hurried out as well--just as the couple was breathlessly re-entering with the milk and bread.

As charity goes \$3.81 is a small pittance, and perhaps that is why the man paid for the couple's food without knowing whether they were truly needy, or just poor money managers, or worse—grifters running a scam at Aldi's. Perhaps he paid it out of a sense of impatience so he could get out of Aldi's and go home. Perhaps he was a disciple, or was helping these folks in the name of a disciple. Who knows? All I know is that he paid for their bread and milk and departed...a good deed done without hesitation, without weighing the pros and cons, without wanting a background check or the assurance that his goodwill was not being misused. And seeing this, I wonder how many other countless "cups of cold water" are offered every day by anonymous folks who simply act on the impulse to help, without thought of risk or reward. Perhaps is it these many anonymous cups of cold water freely given, rather than the large endowments and gifts of giant charities and foundations, that make possible the flow of the Living Water that runs through our common life, keeping us human, humble, and kind-hearted...and keeping us connected to the Primal Goodwill that has given us Living Water, and bread, and milk, since the Beginning.

To return to my story...I was almost to my car when I saw the couple leaving the store, hollering at someone in the parking lot while holding up their bread and milk as if they had just won the lottery. I wish the man who had paid for their groceries could have seen their smiles—it would have been a great reward for his kindness. For whether they deserved it or not, the \$3.81 boon they had received at Aldi's that day, and the thought that they had been smiled upon by someone in this weary world of ours, made them in turn smile in a way that made my heart glad.

How often in our lives do we have the opportunity to offer someone a cold cup of water, and in so doing bring a smile to their face—and the good news that someone has noticed and cared for them? How often do we count the cost of our compassion, when the gift of our kindness, our generosity, our LOVE is its own reward—a reward that aligns us with the kind, generous, and loving soul of the cosmos that we call God? In these days of skepticism and suspicion, of means testing and wide profit margins, every cold cup of water offered to the little ones of this world is the one drink that will truly satisfy our thirst for life as it could be; life as it should be...life lived with one another and FOR one

another as God, and Christ, intended it to be lived. May we all be blessed to be able to offer many cups of cold water in our earthly lives, and as we are blessed with a cup or two in return, may we give thanks for all the generous hearts which make such small acts *among the greatest acts of all*. –Pastor Craig

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 pm by Vice-Moderator, Al Yungclas. Pastor Craig opened the meeting with a prayer. Highlights of the Board Reports were given as follows:

Worship (Holly R.)-The next Saturday service will be September 3. The last Saturday service of the year will be October 15 with Sister Act performing. Choir rehearsal will begin on September 21<sup>st</sup> and will sing on Sunday, September 25<sup>th</sup>; Trustees (Tom R.)-will be getting a new light over the front door of the church, need to get sheet rock in mechanical room of the elevator shaft;

Finance (Tracy W.) the recipients of the college scholarship will be announced at the church service on August 14<sup>th</sup>; Christian Ed (Vicki B.)-is planning for Rally Day on September 11<sup>th</sup>:

Mission (Lorraine M.)-see full report; Evangelism (Laurie E)-Meals 'n' More will not continue this year; Women's Fellowship (Karin Y.)-the executive board will be meeting on August 31<sup>st</sup>;

Staff-Parish-no report; Treasurer's (Tracy W.)-reported the offering for July 1916 was \$12, 190.00 and the expenses were \$11,822.66; the July OCWM was not paid as there was not enough available funds to do so.

He reported that the church needs--\$3,850.00 PER WEEK TO SUPPORT THE BUDGET. Tracy moved and Vicki seconded to accept the reports of the boards and to put the treasurer's report to audit. Motion carried.

**Old Business:** 1-The church directory will possibly be ready in October. 2-Constitution—Went through the newly revised constitution and discussed in detail. Dalene S. moved and seconded by Lorraine M. that the cabinet should vote on the new constitution at the September meeting and the congregation will vote at the Congregational Budget meeting in November.

**New Business:** The church needs a lay delegate to attend the Iowa Conference Annual Meeting on October 22<sup>nd</sup> from 9:30-3:30. The Northwest Association boundary training will be held at our church on Saturday, October 8<sup>th</sup> from 9:00 to 4:00.

#### **Reports of Boards and Committees**

Pastor's Report: He thanked Todd Edeker for filling the pulpit while he was on vacation. Todd will also fill the pulpit on August 28<sup>th</sup> when he is gone. The church picnic was held on July 10<sup>th</sup> in fellowship hall due to rainy weather. August 14<sup>th</sup> will be Scholarship Sunday. The Worship Board has approved moving the September Saturday Worship from the 17<sup>th</sup> of September to the 3<sup>rd</sup> of September. Rally Day will be September 11<sup>th</sup> with Sunday school starting on the 18<sup>th</sup> of September. The chancel choir will resume singing in worship on September 25<sup>th</sup>. The summer KLAB event was held on June 24<sup>th</sup>, at the church, with games, a craft and a wiener roast. KLAB "Nature Day" will be on August 17<sup>th</sup>, from 10 to 4. We will meet at the church, have a lesson and build bat houses for the city, then caravan to Briggs Woods, have a wiener roast, listen to a presentation on snakes by county naturalist John Laid, have a nature hike/scavenger hunt, do a litter pick up and conclude with swimming at Briggs Woods beach. During the worship service on June 26<sup>th</sup> the following were taken into church membership: Amani McMurray, Jennifer Brim, Dilcia Franco, Jose Burgos-Lozada, Chris McNiel and Sunshine Yoders. The Safe Church Policy TEAM will meet in August to prepare for teacher safe church training before Sunday school begins. The Ecumenical Human Needs Committee task force met on June 29<sup>th</sup> and discussed the current guidelines and needs. Sharon Perry is helping process applications for assistance and is conducting screening interviews. The funds have been severely depleted in the last 6 months, down from \$18 K to now about \$4,500. Grants will now be limited to \$500 assistance in a year's time. Jose and Dilcia have joined the EHNC as Spanish translators. Stephen Ministry continues with 5 matches with care receivers. Relay for Life was held at West Twin Park on June 16<sup>th</sup>. It was not as well attended this year as in the past, but was again a meaningful and hopeful gathering. Our church raised \$664 for the cause. The ice cream social was held at Faith UMC this year. The turnout was tremendous and a sneak peek at the cast and songs of WCCT's summer production of "Fiddler on the Roof" was enjoyed by all. The social netted approximately \$1000 for UDMO. Our church worked one week at the summer lunch program. It was noticed there were more people coming in from the general public this year, in addition to the bussed in daycare children. The new Funeral Policy guidelines were published in the June newsletter. A copy of the new policies has been given to Boman and Foster funeral homes. Joyce Gelhaus and the pastor were a part of a Periodic Support Consultation held at First Congregational UCC in Fort Dodge on June 23<sup>rd</sup>. A Situation Support Consultation was held July 7<sup>th</sup> at Fort Dodge. Lifetouch was at the church on June 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> taking pictures for the new directory. The constitution committee has finished their revisions of our church constitution. The document now needs to go to the cabinet to be reviewed and approved.

**Mission Board:** Met on August 4<sup>th</sup> with Rev. Craig Blaufuss, Audrey Burtnett, Marjorie Groves, Lorraine McCoskey, Gayle Olson and Karin Yungclas attending. They discussed the school lunch program noting that Casey's donated ice cream certificates for drawings during the lunches. The associate pastor at Asbury Methodist led recreation two days a week. Audrey suggested having several lunch sites, rather than just at the middle school. Sack lunches were

taken out to the All Cultures Equal building. All the wasted food is a continuing concern. Ginnie Veach chaired the preparation and serving of the July meal at Beacon of Hope. There were more men at the July dinner than we've served before. Annette Howard, Beacon of Hope staff, says some of the new men have mental health issues and need more help than they can provide, but they have nowhere else to go. The shelter's needs remain the same, although they now serve lunch so need bread, lunchmeat, etc. Gift cards for grocery stores (especially Aldi's) are helpful. The next meal our church will serve will be on Tuesday, September 20<sup>th</sup>. Karin is in charge of the meal. Audrey and Mariorie will assist so they can learn to supervise a meal. The person who supervises the meal plans the menu. Plan for 50. The leftovers are left at the shelter. Karin and Audrey chaired our church's co-hosting the ice cream social with Faith Methodist. The recyclable bowls can be cleaned in the dishwasher at both our church and Faith. Pastor Craig and Marjorie received no response from anyone in the congregation interested in participating in prison ministry so the Mission Board will not pursue the topic. Rev. Paul Stone and Rev. Carroll Lang with the Church of the Damascus Road at the Ft. Dodge Correctional Facility say they would be available to speak if we need a pulpit supply sometime. Mary Vavroch served as captain of our church's team for Relay for Life. Cancer survivors and their families seemed to make up most of the Relay participants. The survivors' dinner was an addition to the Relay. The Relay for Life in Hamilton County is struggling, but the Mission Board is willing to support whatever fundraising activities are planned. The church collected breakfast foods for UDMO in July. UDMO will be collecting new coats for kids of all ages soon. They will no longer be accepting "gently used" coats. The board will be keeping TeraCycle on the agenda for future discussion. Gayle will contact Tom McLaughlin about scheduling a time for our church to package meals for Kids Against Hunger. Pastor Craig received a letter from the Iowa Conference of the United Church of Christ seeking donations for seminary scholarships. The letter will be forwarded to the Endowment Committee. Our church will pack the backpacks for the Backpack Program on April 25<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at 6:30 pm at Trinity Lutheran Church. Our church received word on the need for help with the August 6<sup>th</sup>, Christian Music at All Cultures Equal, event too late to do anything. They did ask Michele to send the info to the church e-mail list. They closed the meeting with a lively discussion of how the Mission Board might help educate our congregation in understanding, rather than contempt, which was Pastor Craig's recent message topic. The next meeting is September 1<sup>st</sup>, at 5:00 pm.
