Recently I attended a "Mental Health Awareness Day" held at Trinity Lutheran Church which showcased speakers from Youth and Shelter Services, National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), Central Iowa Community Services (CICS), and our own Hamilton County Social Services and Public Health agencies. It was an intense and eye-opening day for me, as I was not fully aware of the ongoing crisis we are experiencing in our state and beyond with respect to mental illness and its treatment. Consider some of these alarming statistics which were presented to us:

- Each year one in five older Americans experience a diagnosable mental illness such as anxiety, dementia, depression, psychoses, schizophrenia or substance abuse.
- It is estimated that one half of children today have experienced at least 3 Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES). These childhood traumas have been linked to poor mental and physical health and negative social consequences later in life.
- 79% of the children in America with a mental health disorder do not receive treatment, and yet one half of those who experience lifetime mental illness show a need for treatment by age 14.
- In Iowa, approximately 130,000 people are living with a serious mental illness. Yet Iowa has the lowest number of "state" psychiatric inpatient beds of any state in the nation, and overall is ranked 47th for total inpatient psychiatric beds.
- lowa has only 121 psychiatrists in private practice, which is 1 per 25,000 people.
- In lowa, 60 % of adults with mental illness did not receive mental health services, and nearly 44% of those untreated did not receive treatment because they could not afford the cost!
- 4,350 lowans commit suicide annually, which is more than the combined total of vehicle accident deaths and fatal opioid overdoses in our state.

Needless to say, these are startling statistics that are cause for concern, and what is even more alarming is that the state of lowa simply does not have any state-wide system of mental health treatment to properly care for all of her citizens who are struggling mental health issues. Until that changes, we all must do what we can to help others (and ourselves!) Here are some suggestions -- and resources-- to equip us to help:

Be an attentive and compassionate listener. Offering our sincere and attentive presence to another soul is a healing balm that can help them work through a difficult time in their lives. Listening to another's problems can help them overcome feelings of isolation, and allowing them to voice their concerns and their pain can bring clarity and healing. And if you believe that more help is needed than you can offer, then suggest that they speak with their doctor, pastor, or a mental health professional about seeking additional help. Your accepting and caring attitude can go long way in destigmatizing another's need for mental health counseling and treatment!

Understand the negative effects of digital media and the overuse of digital devices. Limit your use of social media and your time spent on electronic devices, and spend time out in nature and with real people creating real (not virtual) relationships.

Take proper care of yourself. Get adequate rest, nutrition, exercise, and recreation, and seek solitude and interaction in balance. Advise others to do the same—and be willing to engage others in healthy relational behaviors!

Be aware of how our own church ministries can help. Our Parish Nurses not only are concerned about your physical well-being, they are concerned with your mental health and peace of mind as well. Mabel Prescott, Joyce Gelhaus, and Holly Riemenschneider will be happy to visit with you, listen to your concerns, and help you get connected to the resources you need. We also have a **Stephen Ministry** program here at First Congregational that matches a Stephen Minister with a

person going through a difficult time in his/her life due to a death, divorce, loss of employment, relocation, etc. We have Stephen Ministers available now who can be of service to you—or to any member of the wider community who needs a caring, listening Christian friend. For more information, please speak with Dale Olson or myself.

Be aware of some basic mental health service providers and how they can help. Here are a few you should know about:

- Central lowa Community Services (CICS): a multi-county service provider for mental health
 and disability services. CICS has a 24 hour crisis hotline number you should know: it is 844258-8858. CICS also has a mobile crisis response team who will provide on-site, face-to-face
 mental health services for an individual or family experiencing a mental health crisis. They offer
 many other services as well: please go to their website (www.cicsmhds.org) or ask me for
 their pamphlet.
- Youth and Shelter Services: a community-based organization serving youth and families, YSS offers a range of counseling options for youth and families and treatment options for youth and young adults who are struggling with substance abuse. They have an office in Webster City: 515-832-1061.
- Senior Life Solutions: a program hosted by Van Diest Medical Center which uses outpatient group counseling to help adults over 65 who are struggling with depression or anxiety. 515-832-7813.
- NAMI/Iowa: Iowa chapter of the National Alliance for Mental Health, NAMI is a grass roots, self- help, education, support and advocacy organization dedicated to improving the lives of families who have relatives with a brain disorder (mental illness). This includes families and individuals diagnosed with a mental illness, relatives and friends, professionals, and all who share NAMI's vision and mission. NAMI helps educate and destigmatize the public about issues of mental illness and health, offers programs about mental health, lobbies for mental health legislation, and has established access centers where individuals in crisis can be stabilized and referred for more help. For more information about NAMI go to www.nami.org.
- **Des Moines Pastoral Counseling Center:** This excellent resource does more than counsel pastors, it is a nonprofit organization providing mental health services to children, adolescents, adults, couples and families. The Center's approach is holistic, integrating mind, body and spirit for healing. To schedule an appointment call **515-274-4006** or email **info@dmpcc.org.**

Friends, for far too long our culture has hidden, ostracized, and minimized the importance of mental health and the treatment of mental illness. We can—and must—do better! Please join me in praying for those who are struggling with mental illness, and please join me in helping those who need healing get connected to the programs, therapists, doctors and caring individuals they need, so they may find the healing and peace of mind they deserve. —Pastor Craig

The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by the Moderator, Donna Ryherd and asked Pastor Craig to offer a prayer. The April Cabinet minutes were approved with corrections. Worship: Flowers for all women will be given out on Mother's Day. Saturday services will be June 16th, July 21st and August 18th. Service will begin at 5:00pm. Evangelism: Laurie will send out a letter and schedule of ushers by mail. Response should also be via mail. Christian Ed.: Possibilities for Sunday school next year will be discussed by the teachers and the Christian Education committee. Treasurer: The report is at the end of the minutes. It was moved and seconded to put the report to audit. Mission: Sign-up sheets are out for the Summer Lunch Program June 11-15. Book donations are again being asked for. Joyce Gelhaus is the team captain for the Relay for Life to be held June 20th in Stanhope. **Women's Fellowship:** The Thrift Sale is coming on the 18th and 19th of May. A voting survey was sent out and the results are for continuing the co-presidency, maintaining 4 circles but assisting other circles as needed. And the Yearbook will be printed. Trustees: Work continues on the grant writing for the stained glass windows. Details are in the attached report. Staff Parish: Staff Parish met to discuss a few issues and resolved both situations. Pastor's Report: Pilgrim Heights now called Our Sacred Space is no longer for sale. A new board will try to get it going. We (UCC) could go to see the improvements and support it. New Business: The Regional Youth Event to be held in Grinnell from June 19-22, 2018 is for 6th graders and up. The cost is \$325 and is divided equally between the parents, the church and the association. Laurie moved and Karin seconded the motion that the funds from the church be taken from Christian Ed. Mission Board: Mission Board met April 10, just an hour or so before the Cabinet meeting. Our church's basket for the Domestic/Sexual Assault Outreach Center (D/SAOC) Cake Auction April 14 came together amazingly well, thanks to the generosity of church members and the community. \$669 was donated in the pickle jar. Lorraine and Curt McCoskey, along with Gayle Olson, used this for gift cards and certificates and also were able to get several complementary gift cards and certificates to total around \$1,000 in Webster City meals, lodging, entertainment and other purchases from 16 or so area businesses. Verna Bierle created a beautiful "basket" to be auctioned at the event in Fort Dodge. One Great Hour of Sharing: The 5-for-5 collection, gathered March 18, brought in \$923, Karin Yungclas reported. Gayle has put out the sign-up sheet for our church's April 24 filling of backpacks to keep school youngsters from getting hungry on weekends. Karin has talked with Faith United Methodist to get planning started for the Ice Cream Social June 13. This year the event will be at Faith. Bars are to be made in 9X13 pans. Marjorie will chair the May 22 meal at the Beacon of Hope shelter for homeless men in Fort Dodge and promote collection of boxes of Kleenex for them. The Summer Lunch Program is a go for another year. Our church will oversee volunteers the opening week. We need five to eight helpers each day. The start date is June 11. The Relay for Life will be in Stanhope, June 20. Gayle will ask Joyce Gelhaus to be captain of our church's team. The next Mission Board meeting is Tuesday. May 1, at 4 p.m.

Mission Board: We met May 1 with all board members and Pastor Craig present. The April 14 Domestic/Sexual Assault Outreach Center Cake Auction took place on a sleety night, but a large crowd came to lowa Central Community College East Campus and helped D/SAOC bring in around \$62,000. Our Webster City basket added to the total, and our church was praised for our ongoing participation, Lorraine McCoskey reported. We still want to do a trash pick-up of the Boone River Recreational Trail (Love of Earth), but our original date was snowed out. Plan B is to make garbage bags and gloves available and to ask everyone to choose his/her own time to pick up trash along the trail and deposit the garbage bag in the church dumpster. Gayle Olson said that on April 24, 13 of us filled around 380 bags in 45 minutes to keep school youngsters from getting hungry on weekends. Our church will help with the Summer Lunch Program at the Middle School June 11-15. We are asking for donations of books again. Our church serves the meal to the men of the Fort Dodge Beacon of Hope shelter on May 22. Marjorie Groves will take food to the shelter and will take the Kleenex collected in the shopping cart in Fellowship Hall. Pat Kesler made a quilt wall hanging, using colors

representing the different kinds of cancer, for Relay for Life. The wall hanging will be offered in a silent auction at the church. Joyce Gelhaus is team captain for our walkers. The Mission Board hosts coffee time on June 3, setting out the pickle jar for Relay for Life. This American Cancer Society fundraiser is in Stanhope, June 20. Karin Yungclas and Audrey Burtnett are working with Faith United Methodist Church, solidifying plans for the ice cream social co-hosted with our church. This year the event will be at Faith June 13. The next Mission Board meeting is Wednesday, June 6, at 4 p.m.

Christian Ed: April 11, 2018 The entire board consisting, of Leah Yungclas, Don Bruner, Jane Klaver, Curt McCoskey, Mary Van Diest and Pastor Craig, was present. Pastor Craig opened with a prayer.

Old Business: We discussed the Easter breakfast and activities for the kids. Approximately 30 attended the breakfast which was held from 9:30-10:15 am. We felt it was worthwhile to do again. We were disappointed in the low turnout for the children's activities (9). They enjoyed the Easter egg hunt and the games. The games used have been stored in the storage room on the 3rd floor, to be used again.

New Business: Discussion was held on when to hold Participation Day and to honor graduates. Don offered to contact Luke Rohmiller if he wishes to participate. On Participation Day Children's Bibles will be given to Oliver Sonsalla, Talon Stockdale, Piper Williams, Henry Elkin, Jackson Elkin, Luna Lahr and Jayleen Burgos. An Adult Bible will be presented to Jackson Leman. All of the adults who so willingly work with our children will be recognized. May 20th will be the last day of Sunday School and also Participation Day during the worship service. KLAB and church school activities during this summer will be announced at a later date. The board is going to ask the present church school teachers to attend our meeting in May to give us their inputs on the pros and cons of this year and suggestions for the future. Pastor Craig presented information on REGIONAL YOUTH EVENT to be held at Grinnell from June 19-22, 2018. This is for 6th graders and up. The cost is \$325/per student with the church paying 1/3, association 1/3 and parents 1/3. See Pastor Craig for the registration deadline. This sounds like a wonderful gathering of like-minded young people. Go online to RYE2018.org at Grinnell to see what a great experience this would be.

Next Meeting is May 9, 2018 at 7:00 pm.

Addition on April 17, 2018—Luke Rohmiller will be recognized as a graduate on May 6th worship service. We would like him to greet before church, and we will have some kind of recognition during the service. The board will serve the fellowship coffee following church to honor him. We will serve cake for this event. Since we will not meet before this Sunday, we will work out the details via email.

Finance Board: April 25, 2018 Present: Don Bruner, Duane Vavroch, Nate Lahr, Dale Olson, Tracy Wehrhan Don agreed to be chairman for the current year. Tracy gave the financial update stating that income through March is done about 25% and expenses are up about 5%.

Discussion was held about the income shortfall. It was decided that Dale would draft a letter to be sent to the congregation that included income and expense data for the years of 2016, 2017 and the first quarter of 2018. The letter will include the option for a direct deposit option that the church has available for a member's convenience.

The scholarship process was discussed. It was decided to move the application deadline up to June 15th and scholarships will be awarded on July 21st. We are hoping for better applicant attendance with the earlier date. Duane will get a name of a local company to get a quote for the audit.

Discussion was held on having all the church's assets in the bond market. Tracy will contact a local firm to see if changes need to be made to our portfolio.

Tracy made a motion to approve the minutes from April 4, 2018 meeting, Tom seconded the motion. It was approved.

Old Business: Donna Ryherd updated us on the Grants. We did not meet the qualifications for the Sacred Places Grant. The Union Pacific Grant we can now apply for since we found the tax number needed from the UCC office. We helped Donna fill in some items for the grant which is due the end of May. Donna will also be applying for the Teresa Treat Stearns Charitable Trust which is a grant from this area. This is also due the end of May. There will be also two other local grants that we can apply for in September. Donna also let us know that the Union Pacific Grant is not a matching grant. If people want to donate to the window fund they can, but they need to talk to Tracy first.

Eric from Cathedral Craft informed us that they hope to come and get started on the Stained Glass Windows, the end of May or the first part of June.

Tracy talked to Scott Jaycox about finishing the elevator shaft. He does not know when he will get to it.

Tom talked to Mark Trueblood about the boiler valves if we should be doing them. Mark will flush the valves once a year.

New Business: There were two church usage forms. Dalene Schlitter- Rotary on 6-4-2018 Leah Maass for a family gathering on April 29. Both Church usage requests were approved.

Tony Jones will continue to mow the lawn for the same price as last year.

The estimate for the year for lawn care by Stony Creek Landscapes was approved.

Joyce did the outside spring cleanup around the church.

The dishwasher in the kitchen has leaked twice when it was started up. Tracy and Tom looked at the water heater for the washer after the meeting. It may be a bad seal. Tom will call Mark Trueblood to get it fixed.

Trustees are responsible to inventory the church. We will take pictures of items and set up inventory sheets by the areas of the church. This will be set up at the May meeting.

The dumb waiter door in the fellowship hall is not working. Tracy and Tom fixed it after the meeting.

The doors on the storage area in the west entrance need new hinges. Al will take care of that.

Discussion on selling the Orff Instruments. Sherry will talk to Don Bruner about that. A suggestion was to have the money go to the Doty Fund.

Discussion was held on the request by Headstart to use our church. Joyce will email Headstart with questions to be answered before we can make a final decision.
