So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on things that are above, not on things that are on earth; for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. Col. 2:12; 3:1-3

#### What do you make of Ash Wednesday?

I once read an article that spoke of Ash Wednesday being a "holy-day" but not a "holiday", and I had to agree: we don't celebrate Ash Wednesday as a holiday the way we celebrate other Christian holidays like Christmas or Easter. No one gets time off work for Ash Wednesday; we don't give or receive Ash Wednesday presents (unless you count a daub of ashes on your forehead as a "present"); there's no merry making or partying on Ash Wednesday; there's no Ash Wednesday greeting cards, or Ash Wednesday carols to sing.

No, Ash Wednesday is definitely not a holiday. It's an anachronism in some ways, a throwback to earlier times when the faithful would mark themselves with ashes, become somber and penitent, confess their sins and unworthiness, and ask for mercy from a just, fearful, and often angry God. No wonder no one thought to commercialize it and make the day into a holiday! No wonder so many Christians have forgotten it, ignore it, or just don't take it very seriously.

But I wonder if we lose an important opportunity when we forget it, or dismiss it in an age in which confessions are now fodder for the tabloids rather than food for the soul, and repentance is usually the consequence of getting caught rather than a sincere desire to turn our lives around. I wonder if by being reluctant to take an accounting of our lives and ask ourselves how we are doing—not in terms of dollars, or awards, or votes, or comfort, but how we are doing in terms of growth, faithfulness, integrity, compassion, and service to others --we have somehow lost sight of the purpose of human life when it is lived in a loving relationship with God.

The apostle Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, speaks to my mind of what Ash Wednesday is all about: setting our minds on the "things that are above." Now perhaps that seems impractical or unimportant when staying on top of things—or even just staying afloat—seems like a full-time job down here on planet earth. But it is the "things that are above" that ultimately hold our destiny as spiritual beings, and on Ash Wednesday we are reminded by a smudge of ashes on our foreheads that *everything we hold dear on this earth will eventually perish*. Every treasure we accumulate will one day be lost; every relationship we hold dear will inevitably change; our own bodies will eventually return to the dust from which they came. Even the stars in the heavens will one day stop twinkling, *leaving us in the end wondering why we were so infatuated with the things that will pass, the things of this earth, and so uninterested in the things that are above, the things that are eternal…* 

Things like the love that lives inside each of us that we bury underneath a mountain of needless fears, selfish ambitions, and negative feelings...

Things like the peace that passes all human understanding that we so easily trade for the favor and good opinions of others...

Things like the joy of communion with our Creator that we forsake for the idols and the half-gods that fill our lives.

Ash Wednesday reminds us that the things that are above—love, peace, the empowering presence of God in our lives--are what ultimately matter in human life, and Ash Wednesday reminds us that if we have forgotten the importance of these things because we are so fixated on the things of this world, then we have the opportunity to change; to repent; to choose another Way by setting our minds on the things that are above.

So perhaps we should make Ash Wednesday a holiday after all! We could make Ash Wednesday greeting cards to mail out to our friends that say: *"Hey—are you setting your mind on the things that are above?"* Then we could mail one to ourselves from time to time to remind us, as Paul suggests, that our lives are hidden with Christ in God--not in the things of this world. That way we could keep Ash Wednesday alive in our churches by keeping the meaning of Ash Wednesday alive... in us.

March 1st marks the beginning of our observance of Lent with our Ash Wednesday Service at 7 p.m. in the East Chapel. I pray that each of you choose to use this holy day to help make Lent *your* holy time: a holy time for your growth and renewal; a holy time when you set your eyes, your minds, your hearts—your very lives—on the things that are above. The meeting was called to order at 7:01 pm by the Vice-Moderator, Donna Ryherd. Pastor Craig offered a short devotion and prayer. Vicki moved with a second by Tracy to approve the minutes of the last cabinet meeting as printed. Motion carried. Tracy gave the treasurer's report as follows: January 2017 Offering--\$23,961.12. January Expenses--\$15,444.63. Tracy moved and Dale seconded to put the report to audit. Tracy did highlight that we began 2017 with only \$6,061.72 in the General Cash Fund. In 2016 the church began the year with approximately \$20,000.00 in the General Cash Fund. Highlights from the boards: **Staff/Parish**- chairman is Stephanie Hill, Secretary-Dalene Schlitter, Cabinet Representative-Shirley Yungclas. They will be meeting on a need to meet basis. Laurie Epps is handling the duties of Chairman, Secretary and Cabinet Representative for the **Evangelism Board.** 

**New Business:** Joyce Gelhaus reported that Relay for Life will be held on June 18, 2017. She asked if the church wishes to participate this year or not. Tracy moved that she and Mission Board work together on this project. Vicki seconded the motion. Motion carried. Dale reported that the Endowment Fund gave \$500.00 to UDMO, \$1000.00 to FFL and \$1500.00 to the Pastor Discretionary Fund. A discussion was held on politics/church.

#### Next Cabinet Meeting Date: March 14, 2017 at 7:00 pm.

#### **Reports of Boards and Committees:**

Pastors: He reported that he was surprised to see everyone in the center front pews for worship on February 5<sup>th</sup>, which was clergy appreciation week. On Wednesday, March 1<sup>st</sup>, he will hold an Ash Wednesday service in the East Chapel. He led care center services on Sunday, January 29<sup>th</sup> at the 3 care centers. On Sunday, Feb. 12<sup>th</sup>, we attempted to hold our worship service sans an accompanist, with mixed results. Cindy Henning, our new Worship Board Chairperson, will now be the contact person for Melissa or Sunshine if they know they will be absent from worship, so we can schedule a substitute. Our young people, led by Katie Sonsalla, will make a joyful noise for us in worship on Sunday, March 5<sup>th</sup>. On April 2<sup>nd</sup>, Rich Pleva will be in worship, and will offer a message of thanks for our ongoing support of OCWM. Lent begins March 1<sup>st</sup>, and Pastor Craig wishes to resurrect the Shalom Circle during Lent as a spiritual discipline. Those who are interested in being a part of this prayer/meditation circle should contact him, so he can gauge interest and set a schedule. KLAB is studying forgiveness, and has spent 3 weeks making dog treats and containers to be sold as a fundraiser for Almost Home in Fort Dodge. The efforts brought in \$120.00. He gave a thank you to all who supported this mission project. On February 15<sup>th</sup> we will have a post-Valentines' Day party for the kids, and on Saturday, February 18<sup>th</sup>, we will host a swim party for the kids from 2:00-5:00 at the Americinn pool. The adult education class is working with the topic of White Privilege. The confirmation class met twice in January and discussed the nature of God and the nature of human beings. On Friday, January 20th, the confirmands and about 16 other adults traveled to the Islamic Cultural Center in Des Moines for a talk on Islam and the observance of their evening prayers. February 5<sup>th</sup> found the confirmands discussing the meaning of Jesus and on Saturday, February 18<sup>th</sup>, we will tour the Hindu Temple in Madrid. Confirmation Sunday will be Pentecost Sunday, June 4<sup>th</sup>. The Backpack program continues to be blessed with donations, including a \$2000.00 donation from our own Neighbors in Need that was given in response to a grant composed by Alyssa Kenville of the Mission Board. This program currently has a balance of over \$14,000.00. The summer lunch program will again be offered at the WC Middle School, and the dates of operation are Monday, June 12th through Friday July 29th. The program will be closed on July 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>. There are 5 Stephen Ministers matched with care receivers. They met on February 3<sup>rd</sup> for their monthly 2 hour session, hearing check-ins and studying the topic of feelings and empathy. The NW Committee on Ministry will meet on Saturday, March 4th at Trinity UCC in Harley for the annual relicensing of clergy who serve churches in our association. Pastor Craig is still waiting for a confirmed date for us to host the NW Association Annual meeting in April. It will be held either April 23rd or the 30th. We will secure a caterer for the noon meal, but Pastor Craig will be asking for donations of bars as snacks for the meeting. With the national news focused on immigration and immigrants, All Cultures Equal is offering several opportunities for people to educate themselves and meet with immigrants in our community. There are now monthly meetings on the last Saturday of the month (10:00-noon) designed to allow community members and immigrants to get to know each other better. There is a new community organization called "Better Together". which consists of community members and immigrants meeting in solidarity with immigrants in order to learn more about pressing topics regard immigration. They recently had a meeting to hear a presentation about being stopped by the Police—also the City Manager, the Sheriff, and the WC Chief of Police were in attendance. On Saturday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, Janet Toering will offer a presentation on immigration (facts vs. myths) at First Congregational beginning at 10:00 am, which will be open to the public. This event is being sponsored by the Mission Board. ACE will hold a "grand re-opening" at their facility on Saturday, March 25<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 to 2:00.

**Worship Board: 1/22/2017 meeting**—Met after the annual meeting with Linda Lahr, Cindy Henning, Verna Bierle, and Gretchen McGlynn present. Mary Vavroch was absent. Board positions volunteered for were: chairperson-Cindy Henning, secretary-Gretchen McGlynn, cabinet representative\_\_\_\_\_\_, alternate representative to cabinet-Linda Lahr, pulpit supply-Linda Lahr and communion elements-Verna Bierle.

According to the new constitution the music committee falls under our umbrella. Stephanie Hill and Kolleen Taylor have expressed interest in being on that committee. We may want to involve Sunny and Melissa. These two will be contacted to see if this is an option for them. The worship board is in charge of summer music. The proposed meeting dates are for the second Thursday of the month at 6:00 pm. This will be confirmed at the February 9<sup>th</sup> meeting. 2/09/2017 meeting—present were Linda Lahr, Cindy Henning and Verna Bierle. Gretchen McGlynn and Mary Vayroch were absent. The meeting date and time will be on the second Thursday of the month at 6:00 pm. Board positions were filled with Cindy Henning as chair, Gretchen McGlynn as secretary, Linda Lahr as alternate cabinet representative and pulpit supply and Verna Bierle as in charge of communion elements. The position of cabinet representative has yet to be filled. Linda will go to cabinet in February. The music committee which is under the Worship Board will be Stephanie Hill, Kolleen Taylor and Sunshine Yoder. Melissa Hindt will help when available. Their duties will include-1. Inform the Worship board contact when the organist or choir director cannot be there on Sunday. 2. Report to Worship Board who appoints/asks for volunteers members (typically a couple of people, choir director and organist). 3. Promotes the musical development of the church. 4. Responsible for the care of choir robes and collars. (may ask choir members to have their own robes cleaned). 5. Ensure piano is watered. 6. Confirms with Worship Board when the organ and piano have been maintained. Susan Knapp-515-576-4952. 7. Arrange for special music for summer services. Cindy Henning will be the contact person for the music committee. She will also create organist list. On April 2<sup>nd</sup> Rich Pleva will visit and give the message. It is to be determined, if we will have special coffee or dinner. The projectionist list needs some more volunteers. After gathering names of those interested in this, a training session will be arranged. The communion servers for March 5<sup>th</sup> are Linda and Cindy and on April 2<sup>nd</sup> Linda and Cindy (unless Rich Pleva wants to help). Dates to remember are: March 1<sup>st</sup>-Ash Wednesday will be in East Chapel at 7:00 pm; March 11<sup>th</sup>-Immigration talk by Janet Toering at 10:00 am; March 19<sup>th</sup>-worship board will serve coffee, decide food next month; April 13<sup>th</sup>-Maundy Thursday-looking for different ideas for service; April 16th-Easter-Christian Ed is serving a coffee hour at 9:30 am, before worship, pew communion; End of April-Norwest Association Annual Meeting which Craig is arranging; May 14th-Mother's Day-decide on flowers for mothers; May 21<sup>st</sup>-promotion Sunday; June 4<sup>th</sup>-confirmation with confirmands helping with communion.

Mission Board: 2/02/17 meeting. Attending were Rev. Blaufuss, Audrey Burnett, Alyssa Kenville, Lorraine McCoskey, Gavle Olson and Karin Yungclas, Lorraine volunteered to be the cabinet representative and Gavle the committee chairperson. Results of the Souper Bowl were given: earned \$337 for UDMO the plus a \$500 donation from the Endowment Committee. It was noted that only 30 people stayed to eat out of the 60 in church. Next year will offer "soup to go" to those who leave; will offer 3-4 varieties of soup instead of 6 or 7; and put vegies and extras on tables so soup line will move faster. About 54 were fed at the January 31<sup>st</sup> feeding at Beacon of Hope. The next meal will be March 21<sup>st</sup> with Marjorie Groves in charge and will serve scalloped potatoes and ham. Everyone is welcome to attend the White Privilege Study that the adult Sunday class is studying. The Funding Future Leadership Offering will be taken February 18, 2017 2th. This new offering sponsored by the Iowa Conference of the UCC, provides scholarship help to persons studying for the ministry. The Endowment Committee allotted \$1,000 to be coupled with the February 12<sup>th</sup> all church offering. The Back Pack Program, which provides weekend food for needy school children is now at \$17000.00. A grant of \$2,000 from the UCC Neighbors in Need was received. Our church will be packing Back Packs in April. Special offering assignments/promotions are—OGHS-March, Lorraine—Strengthen the Church-June 4<sup>th</sup>, Alyssa—NIN-October 1<sup>st</sup>, Gayle—Christmas Fund-December, Audrey. The rugs made and donated by Michele Omvig's dad will be used by the Mission Board as a basis for the D/SAOC basket our church creates for the April 8<sup>th</sup> auction. ACE has long been an interest of the Mission Board. After much discussion about their needs and how we can help Pastor Craig contacted Janet Toering. It was decided to have a meeting with her, open to the community, at our church on Saturday, March 11<sup>th</sup>. The time will be determined later. Next meeting is March 7<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 pm. Bring ideas for the D/SAOC basket.

**Board of Trustees:** Met on Tuesday, February 24<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 pm. Present were Tom Riemenschneider, Tracy Wehrhan, Sherry Leksell, Pastor Craig, and Joyce Gelhaus. Bruce Perry was absent. Old Business: The check was mailed for the pastor's office furniture on 1/23/17. The furniture will be delivered from Homemakers on 2/09/17 or 2/16/17. The valves on the boilers need to be replaced. Mark Trueblood will put in new ones this spring. We will need to flush the valves on a regular basis. Tom will talk to Mark about this and getting the temperature regulated in the basement Sunday school room. There was a discussion on having an outside Fire Box for church keys which would be needed in case of fire. The police and fire departments will have a

key to the box. The Fire Box will be mounted on the brick by the west door key padlock. A motion was made by Sherry and seconded by Tracy to get the Fire Box for \$400-\$500. Motion carried. Tom will get this ordered. New Business: Curt McCoskey, the janitor, will have surgery on his shoulder 1/28/17. Lorraine and Dylan will be doing the janitorial work. New Business: Leah Maass, board member and Sunday School teacher, gave a report to describe the lessons being presented and discussed in her class: Recently Four Black Lives Matter supporters kidnapped and tortured a mentally-handicapped white man from a suburb of Chicago. A video was posted on Facebook Live showing the man being beaten and kicked while tied up and then forced to drink from a toilet during which time the attackers are shouting "f Donald Trump! F white people!" Police refused to say whether or not the attack would be prosecuted as a hate crime. Our class talked about why people can be so cruel and how to find forgiveness in our hearts for such sins and we prayed for them all. Moses and the Ten Commandments is our current study. The womens' march following President Trump's inauguration was compared to the Israelites and how they kept grumbing after being freed from the Egyptians. We were reminded: "It's easy to let a complaining attitude take over when things are not going our way. As God's children we need to trust that he is in charge and will work things out. Sometimes delays are the fault of our disobedience and sometimes they are meant to help us grow. In either case, grumbling displeased God and should be avoided." The Ten Commandments discussions began as God spelled out to Moses the laws that tell us how to treat Him and others. Then God told Moses that if the people would obey His covenants, their nation would be great and Holy in His sight! We talked about what each of our families has set up for rules at home and how much happier the household is when those rules are followed. In the same respect, the rules and laws of our country are intended to be obeyed because they define our civilization. Without laws our lives and property and general welfare are at risk and those who do not follow the rules should be awarded the punishment described within those rules. And we discussed the illegal aliens who intentionally disobey our laws, but expect to receive the

rights and protections of the citizens who live by the rules and those who immigrated legally. Bullying keeps coming up in all of our discussions and we wonder why adults claim that bullying is bad, but continue to use that activity themselves to intimidate people who do not agree with them. With all of the Blessings God has showered upon our nation, we continue to witness people creating violent demonstrations like tantrums of spoiled children who are never satisfied, vilifying those with whom they disagree and disrespecting the men and women who have pledged their lives to protect and serve our nation.
