"Behold, I stand at the door, knocking...."--Revelation 3:20

I recently listened to a YouTube video showcasing R.C. Sproul, who was making a convincing argument from scripture that the progressive protestant pablum about God being unconditionally loving is not only pablum, it's a dangerous heresy! He explained that because humans are fallen and live in open rebellion against God, the wrath of God is heaping up against the unsaved, and it is growing daily. He went on to suggest that there is no understanding of the good news without the understanding of the "bad news" that Christ came into a world under indictment for rejecting God. People aren't afraid of the wrath of God, he argued, because people have been taught that God is like Mr. Rogers, which takes the "terror out of it." Sinners need to be terrified about their condition! (check it out: https://youtu.be/fcOzTZUOBn0)

R. C. makes a point: perhaps Christianity without fear doesn't have much power to grip rebellious sinners' minds and hearts and turn them toward repentance. An all-loving God who has no "teeth," so to speak, is an easy God to ignore. Yet if this is true, and God indeed wants to save us from wrath by using terror, then why isn't God terrorizing us in more direct ways these days? I'm not talking about TV preachers telling us that hurricanes and Ebola outbreaks or dead soldiers are the handiwork of God's wrath. God should be able to do better than that! If God really wants to save us through fear, then God should show us REAL RAGE in really clear ways. God should take a cue from The Wizard of Oz and write "Surrender Dorothy" in the sky while raining fire and brimstone on us, so we can really see for ourselves that God is indeed angry...and we can repent and be saved!

Honestly I sometimes do wonder if Christianity is the craziest of all the world religions with ideas such as these. Regardless of whether it is biblical or not, a raging God who wants to save us by using fear sounds very *human*—much like my middle school health teacher and PE instructor who once tried to "save" a rebellious student by throwing him against a wall (yes—he literally pulled him out of his seat and THREW him against a wall). Did he get the class's attention? Yes. Did we toe the line afterward? Pretty much--we were terrified of him. Did we love him after that? I can only speak for myself, but I could never trust him or love him again after that assault, because *I was now afraid of him...and you can't really love those you are really afraid of.*

When I hear the quote attributed to Jesus from Revelation "Behold, I stand at the door, knocking," I hear a deep truth being expressed about love and fear. If God's real wish is for us to love God and neighbor, then God can't kick down the door of our hearts and terrorize us into loving either God or our neighbor. God instead knocks, and knocks, and knocks...and never stops knocking until we come to our senses and let God in. For God's way is the way of perfect peace, which is the way of perfect love untainted by fear. God's wish is not that we would be saved from God's eternal wrath, but instead that we would be saved from ourselves—our unloving selves which turn brothers into enemies, sisters into objects, and the creation into a playground and dumping ground for our endless hunger and thirst for pleasure and self-destruction. I agree with R.C. about one thing: everything is at stake when we speak of the character of God, for when we misunderstand or misrepresent God we do incalculable harm to God's plans to make all things new.

Holy Week is coming in April, and with its coming we have yet another opportunity to reflect on the message of God's love revealed in the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The cross as an instrument of Roman punishment is an example of Roman wrath used to terrorize subjugated peoples so that they would toe the line and be obedient Roman subjects. We know how that worked out for the Romans—their cruelty only manifest more hatred toward the empire from their subjects! To my

mind Jesus did not endure the terror of the Romans so that we would be spared an ever greater terror from God, packaged as an eternity being tortured in hell. Instead, I believe Jesus remained faithful to God and to the message God sent him to proclaim even unto death...and his resurrection is the sign that love, not wrath and terror, is the cosmic power which makes all things new. For theologians this is called the "Christus Victor" model of the atonement; for me it is the only way I can make sense of the horror of Good Friday and not surrender my conviction that God is *truly and only* a God of love.

Friends, take time this month to prepare yourself for Holy Week by meditating of the character of God and the nature of love. Open your heart to the leadings of God's Spirit, and seek to hear the Inner Voice of Truth. Most of all, as you have heard me say before, give God the benefit of the doubt and dare to believe that God can get human beings to repent and transform through the mighty power of LOVE....rather than the terrifying power of FEAR.

Happy Easter! He is Risen!

Happy Earth Day!

Are you doing your part to take good care of our earth? April 22 is Earth Day and a great opportunity to think about what we do to keep our planet clean and safe for today and for future generations of humans and animals. Here are some fast facts from *National Geographic* about plastic pollution:

Only about 9 percent of all plastic ever made has been recycled. Europe recycles at a rate of 30 percent, China at 25 percent and the United States at 9 percent.

18 billion pounds of plastic waste goes into the ocean every year. This is equivalent to five grocery bags of plastic trash sitting on every foot of coastline around the world.

Shoppers in the U.S. use almost one plastic bag per resident per day compared with shoppers in Denmark who use an average of four plastic bags per year. Do you use reusable bags when shopping?

Nearly a million plastic bottles are sold every minute around the world. In the United States in 2015, we purchased 346 bottles on average per person. Do you have a refillable water bottle? – *The Mission Board*

Pastor's Report to Cabinet March 8, 2019

Worship: We cancelled church 2 Sundays in a row (Feb 17 and Feb. 24) due to the weather. Hurry up, Spring! We did return to worship March 3 and shared Holy Communion, and on March 6 we gathered in the East Chapel for an Ash Wednesday service, with the imposition of ashes and Holy Communion. Our next Care Center worship services will be March 31, and during our worship service that day our KLAB kids will present an early Easter skit.

Adult Education: We have concluded a study of the biblical prophets, and have discussed the recent decision of the UMC General Conference to retain the "Traditional Plan", effectively barring LGBT persons from becoming clergy, and also prohibiting same-sex marriages from being conducted by UMC clergy.

Confirmation: On March 2 the confirmands set a record solving Rotary's escape room challenge at lowa Central, and we celebrated at Subway at the end of the event. March 6 we organized the next Beacon of Hope Meal and the students helped me set up the East Chapel for Ash Wednesday. The next Beacon Meal with be Wednesday March 20, which is Spring Break for the Confirmands, so I will need to recruit additional help to serve.
