"Be kind to each other, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you." –Ephesians 4:32

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." -Matthew 5:5

"Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful." –Colossians 3:15

I have been thinking and praying about what topic to study as we begin our 2019-2020 Adult Sunday School class (we have done so many!), and Wednesday morning this answer came: "Study the qualities of Christian character."

OK...my first reaction was to wonder about this suggestion, for it sounds rather dry, almost sanctimonious and not one that seems to fit our practice of studying highly relevant, provocative, and timely topics. But the more I thought about it, the more I realized that it is a very timely topic in our day and age! Today we have role models and exemplars of character in abundance—they saturate our lives through the media and social media—and they showcase every conceivable quality of character. It seems obvious to most Christians that some of these qualities of character are decidedly "unchristian": racism, a thirst for violence, hatred of strangers, base cruelty, unchecked greed, an obsession with lust, bullying and the oppression of the weak, disdain for the poor, the sick, the disabled....etc. These decidedly unchristian qualities are easy to spot, reject, and stand against as expressions of our "fallen nature" or of "unredeemed humanity"...to be countered and corrected by the virtues of "Christian character."

And yet, what is a distinctly Christian character? I don't have to tell you that even Christians cannot agree on the essential qualities of Christian character. The proponents of the prosperity Gospel claim that one essential quality of Christian character is to be faithful enough to "plant a seed"—so that God will bring them (not the world— just "them") a "harvest." Is this kind of quid pro quo relationship with God part of our Christian character? There are those who claim (Reinhold Niebuhr among others) that an essential part of Christian character is to protect the weak and the defenseless—even if that protection results in violence and killing as a necessary evil. Is the use of violence against others as a form of defense and self-defense a quality of Christian character? Western Christianity has decided that a quality of Christian character is charity—but it is a guarded charity that does not hold all things in common, as the Bible reports the earliest Christians indeed did as a community of believers. Is our form of economic capitalism, and the private ownership of property and wealth, a form of Christian character? And in an age when "love" can mean everything from loving pizza to loving my favorite sports team to loving my dog, my country, or my romantic partner du jour... in what sense is love, as Jesus practiced and taught love, an essential quality of Christian character?

As you can see, the more we delve into the topic of Christian character the murkier the waters seem...and yet it should seem obvious to us all that developing our Christian character is an essential part of our discipleship AND our mission in the world. It is perhaps the most effective outreach we as Christians have, for the people we meet may not study the bible, they may have no interest in church or church life, and they may have no use for Christian cosmology or our doctrines or our professed plan of salvation...

But they will read our character, they will respond (pro or con) to our distinct way of being in the world, and they will see in our ways of living and loving an offer of salvation—not in the sense of being saved from the hell of the afterlife, but in the sense of being saved from the hell of aimless and out of control lives; empty and meaningless lives; lives that live by the feud or the fix; lives that are

divorced from the ways that lead to real peace, abiding joy, a sense of cosmic belonging...and a life devoted to lovingkindness as the grandest expression of human character.

Friends, as you read this I would urge you to take the next step and actually compile your list of the essential qualities of Christian character. What would you choose? Meekness and humility? Peacefulness? Righteous anger? Fortitude? Generosity? Courage? Nonviolence? Self-control? Joy? Submission? Hope? Make the list of qualities that seems definitive of what you most admire about Christians. Then...ask yourself what you are doing to manifest these qualities in your life as the highest good that you are offering to the world, and ask yourself what needs to change in your life to bring these qualities to life...in you.

I hope you will join us in Adult Sunday School class starting September 15 for this important and useful study! -- Pastor Craig

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 pm by the Moderator, Nate Lahr. Pastor Craig opened the meeting with a devotional and a prayer. The minutes of the July cabinet meeting were read. Donna Ryherd moved and Dale Olson seconded that the minutes be approved as read. The motion passed. **Christian Education:** Their meeting is scheduled for the 25th or the 28th of August so they have not met yet. An informational letter will be going out this fall. Evangelism: Presently they are updating the children's bags as well as the Welcome Bags. The Jello cookoff went very well and many thanks to Marilyn Middleton for her expertise. Compensation for stamps needs to be made to Wilma Reinsel. Finance: July offerings were \$8,078.00 and expenses were \$12,098.68. The budget meeting is scheduled for the end of September. Scholarships have been awarded. Mission: Board members want to thank all for volunteering food for the Beacon of Hope meals. Also 24 electric fans or enough money for 24 fans was donated to UDMO. A plan to feed the staff of the community school is in the works. A \$1,000 gift was received (anonymously) for the Migrant shelters. Mission Board members are also exploring alternatives to foam and plastic in compliance with a Resolution adopted by the General Synod this summer. Staff/Parish: We have had no issues so far this year therefore nothing to report. **Trustees:** A new sign was purchased for the sale of the lots. A change in the fees schedule for use of the church facilities was instituted. Sharing the church with Iglesias de Dios Pentecostal MI is still going well. Worship Board: Next meeting is September 12th. The 17th of August is the last Saturday service for 2019 and root beer floats will be served following the service. Women's Fellowship: The Circle Booklets have been completed. The next meeting is scheduled for the end of August. Pastor's Report: Pastor Craig will speak to the representative of the Iglesias church regarding their continued use of the church and fees. The Ministeriam will elect Rev Mike Kroona's replacement. Treasurer: The July offerings are well short of the expenses. The fees charged to the Iglesias church need transferred to the General Fund. Tracy Wehrhan moved to put the report to audit. Dale Olson seconded. The motion passed and the report was put to audit.

Complete Board reports are attached. **Pending:** All cabinet members are asked to take part in the Periodic Support Consult with Chris Burtnett from the Northwest Association Committee on Ministry. He will meet with Pastor Craig and then the cabinet members on August 27th. **Comments:** Holly Riemenschneider commented on the good experience she had as a server at the Beacon of Hope meal. Donna Ryherd mentioned that Anna, who escaped trafficking in Romania, is getting married this summer. Women's Fellowship assisted her with getting her documents. Next meeting is September 10 at 7:00pm.

Donna Ryherd moved and Stephanie Hill seconded the motion that we adjourn. The motion passed. Adjourned at 7:41pm.

Board of Trustees Tom brought a metal sign to post on the lots for sale. Joyce took it to Cindy, to customize it with "FOR SALE BY OWNER 515-832 2232." Our contract with Neighbors has run out. Tom put up the new paper towel and soap dispenser in the kitchen. They meet the handicap requirements. The Pentecostal church remodel is nearing completion. They pay every two weeks. No problems have been reported. Some issues with the Women's restroom had come to our attention. Tom discussed them with Curt. The Bride's restroom toilet was clogged. The plunger was used on it.. Mark Trueblood came and checked it. Mark said that if it did clog again to call Rotor Rooter because he does not do that work anymore. Church Usage request approve for PEO September 12 6PM. Tom will clean the little trees out of the gutters, on the garage. Discussion was held on the fees for Use of the Church Facilities. We changed the following charges for Non-Members: Dining Room and Kitchen \$25 to \$50.Use of dishes and table service \$10 to \$25. (If use paper please take out the trash) Custodial fee for Fellowship Hall \$25 to \$35/ first hour and \$15 to \$35 for each additional hour. Classroom or East Chapel \$10 to \$25. Sanctuary \$50 to \$100.

2020 Trustee Budget was done. Joyce will check with Pastor Craig on cost of a new computer for him. Tom checked with Trash Man to see what the change would be in cost if we changed from pick up of 4 times a month to 2 times a month. It was \$25 dollars a month difference. No change was made. We went outside to look at the drain for the sump pump on the south side of the church. It clogs with leaves and grass, then floods the sidewalk. Bring ideas next month on how to fix this. Mission Board We met July 31 for our August meeting. Even during the summer, our church continues to be active in mission work. We collected \$39 in Happy Dollars for the Agape Fund Sunday July 28. On July 30, the 35-40 men of Beacon of Hope enjoyed the dinner we prepared. The menu of hot ham sandwiches, watermelon and more was popular. Servers were Andrea and Ed Mosbach, Jill Coons, Madison Babington, Jane Klaver, Jan Maxon and Holly Riemenschneider. 24 electric fans were delivered to UDMO, for our July Upper Des Moines Opportunity collection. Planning for our Teacher Appreciation ice cream is in the works. The Mission Board has been given \$1,000 by an anonymous donor to be used as we choose. After much discussion over several meetings, we voted to give the money to the Monastery Migrant Shelter of Tucson. The money will be used for clothing and toiletries needed by new arrivals into the U.S. This group has been supported by the United Church of Christ One Great Hour of Sharing. Gayle is investigating coffee mugs in place of Styrofoam or plastic served at coffee gathering places, such as McDonald's, or at coffee fellowship time. A resolution passed at the recent General Synod, stated: "Be it . . . resolved that Thirty Second General Synod encourages Conferences, Associations and Congregations to educate their members about plastic foam and that they encourage the use of alternatives such as paper products or, better yet, ceramic or other dishwasher-safe products." The Mission Board discussed encouraging church members to use reusable mugs, as a test, before we take the concept to the wider community. Marjorie will find out when the CROP Walk is planned for this year. September 15's coffee fellowship time will feature the Pickle Jar for CROP donations. April 28 is our church's tentative date for Backpack packing. Would there be interest in taking a carload of folks from our church to help the rebuilding of Pacific Junction (Mills County, between Glenwood and the Nebraska border), after flooding damage? The Glenwood UCC and nearby churches are helping.

Worship Board Our board business was taken care of through e-mail. August 17th will be our last Saturday evening worship service. Root beer floats will be served after the service. Video sermons

are going over well. Our budget for the Worship Board has been turned in, as well as the budget for the Chancel Committee and Music Committees.

Pastor's Report Worship: Summer worship continues with diminished attendance but thoughtful services nonetheless. Our Saturday Service on July 20thhad several scholarship recipients in attendance, and then we FEASTED on a fabulous pot luck and some marvelous Jello creations! Thanks to Marilyn Middleton who judged the Jello cooking entries; I was blessed to sit at the table where all 3 contest winners were seated! Our next Saturday service will be August 17, and following the service the worship Board will serve root beer floats. A nice way to end our summer worship series! Church Building Sharing with Iglesia de Dios Pentecostal MI: I have not yet received word when our space sharing with Iglesia will be concluded. Stephen Ministry: We currently have 2 Stephen Ministers matched with care receivers. Sharon Perry led our last class session using a lesson from the book "Caring Evangelism: How to Live and Share Christ's Love". We will use this book and supplemental materials for our next series of lessons. Ecumenical Human Needs Committee: A meeting was held by pastors and other people committed to EHNC on Thursday, August 1. The consensus was that the EHN work should continue on, and Sharon Perry was appointed as the interim replacement for Rhonda Masser. Sharon will receive applications and interview applicants once a week on Wednesdays at First Congregational, from 9-11 a.m. UDMO is aware that EHN is now resuming taking applications, so we expect applications to start coming in again shortly. A follow up meeting is scheduled for August 22, 10 a.m. at Asbury UMC, to go over the current guidelines for the fund and evaluate if there needs to be changes. Periodic Support Consultation: Christ Burtnett contacted me and the Northwest Association Committee on Ministry wants to set up a Periodic Support Consult with myself and the church leadership on either Tuesday, August 27 or Thursday, August 29. A PSC is a set of questions offered by CoM facilitators that allow pastors and church leaders to reflect on their shared ministry, explore new possibilities, consider what could be done differently in ministry, celebrate successes and joys, and name hopes and concerns for the future.
