"Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; It is too high, I cannot attain it."—Psalm 139:6

You may have noticed that Cathedral Crafts of Winona, Minnesota is back in town and renovating more of Asbury UMC's stained glass windows. Seeing the familiar trailer of Cathedral Crafts caused me to fondly remember our own stained glass window renovation. If you remember, workmen from Cathedral Crafts came in June of 2018 to remove and transport all 38 of our windows to their shop in Winona, Minnesota. There Cathedral craftsmen made an etching of each window, painstakingly disassembled each piece of stained glass, cleaned them, and then reassembled the windows by custom cutting the lead came, bending and fitting it around each piece of glass and then soldering each piece together. When all the stained-glass pieces were reassembled, the entire window was mudded to make it weathertight and then the glass window was carefully reinstalled in its wood frame. This morning when I entered the sanctuary and gazed up at our largest windows, I noted the hundreds of pieces of glass in each one...and I was filled with wonder at the amount of skilled work that made these glass curtains possible. I was also filled with wonder at the cost of restoring all 38 windows: only \$88,280! While that is no small sum, I can't imagine how they could remove, transport, restore, and reinstall all of our windows for that amount of money. It still seems nothing short of miraculous, and this morning I was as touched by this sense of wonder as I was touched by the wonder of their beauty.

Wonder. It is certainly one of the most unique characteristics of being human. All of us have experienced wonder in our lives, and we all can recall moments when a sense of wonder overcame us with feelings of amazement, gratitude...and a sense of bumping up against something beyond us that we can somehow sense but can't fully grasp: a *beyond-ness* which brings a feeling of reverence to our minds. Now it is true that most days we don't necessarily like being reminded that there is far more to Life than what we know, have experienced, and will ever understand...and add to that a desire or need for efficiency in getting through our demanding days, and wonder can seem like a luxury best left to poets, astrophysicists, and movie makers.

And yet from time to time we are surprised by wonder-- even as I was this morning. Frost makes a pattern on a window that is transfixing--more like the work of God than the freezing characteristics of mist—and we feel wonder. Spring returns, flowers emerge, and trees bud out, and we marvel at the return of Life after another cold winter. A puppy or a child is born...and we are put on our knees by the incomprehensible mystery of how such life came to be. Who formed its *form*? Where did this life come from? What kind of world do we live in where such things that we could never make happen on our own seem to happen so magically; so spontaneously? When you feel this kind of wonder you are transported to a different state of consciousness where your rambling mind is paused-- silenced by your entrance into one of Life's Holy of Holies: the wonderful *beyond-ness* of things that suddenly grasps hold of you, filling you with the light of reverent thanksgiving for the mystery and the goodness of Life.

Friends, we need these experiences of wonder to counteract our malaise, our boredom, our cynicism and our general lack of appreciation for all that Life offers us! For these days I know that so much of our wonder feels less ecstatic and more fearful as we wonder what tragedy or human injustice will next occur, or what byproduct of our insatiable greed and incredible shortsightedness will bring more suffering and weariness to our weary world! This kind of wonder—fearful wonder—is the great killer of the reverence and joy that wonder should bring to our hearts, even as it is the great killer of trust in the mysterious *Beyond* whom Christians call God. And yet the Psalmist who

composed Psalm 139 assures us that the mysterious and wonder-filled *Beyond* we sense in the midst of all Life is benevolent, pervasive, and of loving intent; infinite in thought and being, and steadfast toward us. This God, who is so beyond our human comprehension, has brought all the wonder-filled worlds into being, and in the vast unnumbered thoughts of God's inescapable Presence our story is known, cherished, and held fast with an otherworldly love. That God should be so beyond us, and yet so with us and for us was a source of comfort, joy and ultimate wonder to this ancient sage who found his peace in the God he tried to describe in his psalm. And we who inherit his wonder-filled words can still join him in his amazement and wonder as we too realize that such love, such care, such creativity and such purpose is so near, so helping, so enlivening, and so inspiring! As we continue to live into 2021, may we all be blessed to experience this sense of wonder, so that we can live with more joy, more gratitude, and more TRUST: in God, and in the wonder-full unfolding of our human lives! — Pastor Craig

NOTICE

All persons entering the building are warned the Hamilton County Public Health will not notify the church or pastor of individual positive cases of Covid 19. If there are multiple cases linked to the church location, a courtesy call will be made to the pastor, but no names given.

When an individual test is positive, they are asked to name the people they were in contact with-in the past 48 hours before receiving the positive test results. (Contact= within 6 feet for 15 minutes or more). IF the infected person supplies names, those individuals will be notified and asked to guarantine for 2 weeks.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by the Moderator, Nick Oberender in Fellowship Hall with protocols in place. Pastor Craig opened the meeting with a prayer. The minutes of the February 2021 cabinet meeting were read. Gayle Olson moved and Carol Crystal seconded a motion that the minutes be approved with corrections. The motion passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Expenses exceeded income by approximately \$4,000. Offerings for February are \$10,268.31 and expenses are \$12,049.30. Tracy Wehrhan moved and Dale Olson seconded that the report be put to audit. The motion passed without challenge.

Pending Business:

a. Continued discussion on current worship status and worship protocols were discussed. Several changes were made: Seating on the red cushions only; Limited indoor visiting; though choir will not be reenabled, singing by the congregation with masks is permitted; worship will begin at 10:00 and will be outside as weather permits. Stephanie Hill moved that the adjusted protocols be adopted. Joyce Gelhaus seconded. The motion carried unanimously.

Board Summaries: Women's Fellowship: The Mayflower and Morningstar circles are combining. September 25 and 26 and tentative dates for the Thrift Sale. Determining how to control the amount of donations we can handle is being considered since it's been so long since our last sale. **Christian Education:** met last week. Twenty-three We Care bags were given out. Birthday cards by Patty Gescheidler will be sent out. There are now 5 confirmands and 3 graduates. Graduation day is May 16, 2021. **Mission:** Beacon of Hope meal served on March 17th went well. There were 270 t-shirt totes donated to the Food Bank of Iowa and All Cultures Equal so far. This project will continue until the end of March, but may continue after that if other uses are found. A date will be set for a Brownie Sundae Drivethru. The annual clean-up project organized by Mission Board will be scheduled and may serve as community service work for juveniles. **Staff Parish:** Has not met yet. **Trustees:** Several projects are being completed in the church. Repair and painting of outside doors; high toilet for the bride's bathroom; pricing of lawn care and a scanner/copier; a phone line for the elevator which is required by the state. Fire

extinguishers need filled; new LED lights in the office. **Worship:** Communion by intinction is no longer permitted. Pew communion only from now on. Feedback is needed for the question of how often communion should be served. There is no issue with the current scheduling – this is just a question. Please send feedback to Worship Board or Pastor Craig. **Finance:** Has not met. **Evangelism:** Has not met. **Pastor's Report:** Attendance has been close to 50 for services so far. Care Center Sunday church services are not resuming. Visitations are now allowed with a negative Covid test or vaccination. UCC General Synod will be held virtually. Stephanie Hill and Pastor Craig will be attending as delegates. The memorial service for Caryl Hollingshead will be held May 13th in our sanctuary with a 50 person limit. A graveside service for Karen Weir is planned for May 14th for family members only.
