“Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me.”—John 15:4

My relationship with my father changed on May 18, 2011, which was the day he died. That was a hard day, for I loved my father and I still love him...and so I try to keep the memory of his presence alive as best I can-- even after all these years. I still can hear some of his memorable words to me, words of wisdom and affection (he always called me “lefty”); I remember doing home repairs with him and wrenching on the family cars (he showed me how to time an engine back when engines needed to be timed); I have photos of him at family events that remind me of bygone moments of our lives together; I have old stories of family vacations, holidays, and other events that I still hold dear. I can talk to him, even now...and I can imagine what he might say back to me. But he is no longer with me the way he once was—fully present—and since he died, our relationship is not the same.

I also have relationships with people whom I have never met, yet they are people whom I respect and admire, people whom I have listened to and taken inspiration from. MLK, Osho, Buddha, Lao Tzu, Meister Eckhart, an entity named Seth...these are a few of my personal heroes, and I have their words, their books, and a few videos and pictures of some of them which capture their time on earth. I owe a great debt to them in many ways, for they have helped shape my life...but my relationship with them is not the same as it would be if I had been in the same room with them, ate supper with them, or traveled on the road with them. When you are really present with someone you are more compelled to interact with them; being really present both challenges and reassures in a way that a memory cannot. Being really present with someone changes your present moment experientially, existentially...in the way that a memory or a story or even a photo or video does not.

And so when I hear people speak of Jesus being their “personal savior” I try to suspend my liberal protestant disdain for such talk and listen to what they are saying. Yes, I’m sure some who use this phrase are programmed to use it, even as we in our UCC tradition have certain theological buzzwords that we use almost as insider shorthand. But I know of people who claim to have vivid, unshakable experiences of the very presence of Jesus Christ, and those kinds of experiences seem to have been profoundly life changing for them. I can understand why, for as I noted, there is no substitute for the power and the impact of a real presence versus a memory or legacy of that presence. And yet that is where many of us find ourselves in our faith life: immersed in theology and memories and mores and history, surrounded by articles of faith and symbols of presence...yet hungering at some level for a real presence of the holy; the *Mysterium Tremendum*; a living presence that is capable and responsive, guiding and impressing in a way that only a real presence can be.

That is one of the reasons why the resurrection of our Shalom Circle has been so needed by my spirit and my faith walk. Yes, the relaxation techniques help “cool down” our overstimulated, overheated brains—and if there were no other benefit to the circle, that would be reason enough to come. But for me there is more... for I feel that I am being drawn into an immersive experience that words would fail to contain, even though we have words a-plenty to describe the experience. It is an immersion into a felt presence; an oceanic presence of such love and vitality and goodwill that the anxious, scurrying small “me” can let go of my anxious scurrying and *just abide...without fear, without the past or future, without the feeling of deadness or dread or vacuous meaningless emptiness that so often is our subconscious baseline that we stuff down deep*. During the meditations I enter into this presence with varying degrees of immersion, and even as I find my peace in the experience, I know that there is so much more...so much deeper I could go...so much infinity beyond what my small self is capable of experiencing and knowing. In this deep meeting, this deeply personal meeting, I feel

more changed and more en-lightened than I do when I am away from this experience --and this presence.

Now you who are mystically inclined know that the goal of such immersive moments is to eventually attune ourselves to carry this felt meeting-presence with us always, and I'm sure you can appreciate that this takes practice, discipline, a willingness to let go of so much of our lives' detritus...and faith. Yet the journey of 1000 miles begins with a single step, and in these weekly encounters with a living presence that we might call God, or Jesus, or the Holy Spirit, we set the intention that we can and should abide in this presence for the sake of our sanity and our souls...so that both might know the grace of peace and illumination which is the free gift of seeking and experiencing this form of a "personal savior."

I believe years ago I spoke in church of my experience encountering the living Jesus during a Shalom Circle meditation that was held in Troy, Missouri. We were meditating in a cry room of the church, and while in the meditation I saw the face of the Shroud of Turin—my personal symbol for the presence of Christ--and into the room came a presence that was palpable. There were no words offered, no reminders of Jesus' teachings or words of wisdom given to me by him...instead there was a shift in my consciousness as the entire room became alive with feeling and pulsing with vitality. It felt that even the molecules of the air were alive and singing praise for the gift of life; the very walls came alive with an awareness that defied the dead matter of masonry and mortar. What filled the room that evening was so deeply felt that in that moment I knew just how sacred and alive and creative and joyous this entire existence truly is. The experience testified to literal worlds without end filled with God and God-energy; every atom and brick and cell and heart filled with the good news that all of Life is one and filled with God's endless outpouring of "God." The experience lasted perhaps 5 minutes, but those minutes convinced me that God is utterly good and loving with "no shadow of turning," so generously creative that all of THIS is an outpouring of God's infinitely expanding self—all joined into a cosmic unity that erases all loneliness and fear and desolation from our sorrowed human hearts. If you read this and your heart leaps to hear this testimony---that is good! Only don't let painted cakes satisfy your hunger, for God is meant to be experienced and shared by each of us—directly. This is our birthright as children of God: the Good News that God is an intensely personal savior whom we can experience, and in whom we can abide!

Friends, you are all invited to give the Shalom Circle a try (Fridays at 6: 30 p.m. in the East Chapel), and see if it "clicks" for you. Regardless of whether it feels right to you or not, I invite you all to use this holy time of Lent to deepen your experience of God through prayer, devotional reading, and by sharing your "real" presence-- and your love-- with other people. To do this is to honor God, to follow Jesus, and by sharing what is best in your human life through your presence, you can *and will* make all the difference in a world starving for authentic human presence of a kind that opens and extends the love and the joyous compassion of the ultimate presence: God. --Pastor Craig
