"But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again."

"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." —Luke 7: 27-36

Ever throw a boomerang? If you have, you probably learned something about boomerangs: they do NOT always come back to you. I had one once when I was younger, and whenever I threw the thing it would land 50 feet in front of me, 50 feet behind me, or 50 feet to the side of me. I could throw that boomerang a hundred times and *never* have it come back to me the way I wanted it to!

Have you noticed that love is very much like a boomerang? Have you noticed that when you throw love out into the world you are always hoping it will return to you-- and yet there's no telling where it will travel, or where it will land? Have you noticed that like my childhood boomerang you can throw love out in a hundred different ways, but there is no guarantee that it will ever come back to you?

Now to be fair, sometimes boomerangs do return to the thrower, and most of us have thrown love out into the world and had it returned to us from those we are closest to: our parents, our spouses, our children, our friends, and our pets. It is a blessing to be able to throw love out into the world and receive it back from those who are near and dear to us!

But Jesus wants us to take the art of throwing love out into the world *beyond* those we are closest to. As Jesus notes in the Sermon on the Plain, even "sinners" love those who love them, do good to those who do good to them, and lend to those who can repay the loan with interest. There is a strong sense of certainly in that; an expectation of a guaranteed return which is more like a *game of catch* than it is like throwing a boomerang.

And while I certainly believe Jesus doesn't despise the love of family, friends, and pets, he is asking us to take the love we have to give *beyond* the game of "catch." Jesus is asking us to throw our love out into the world knowing that there are those who cannot return our acts of love...those who WILL NOT return our acts of love...even those who will stomp on our acts of love and return anger, or even hatred, to us. Jesus teaches those with ears to hear that we are to join him in the work of throwing love out into the world in the hope that love may be seen, felt, and known where it has not been seen, felt, and known before. And Jesus teaches us that we are to do this without the expectation that our love will be returned to us!

As I think of benevolences we support as a congregation—UDMO, ACE, DSAOC, Ecumenical Human Needs, the Agape Fund, Beacon of Hope Men's Homeless Shelter, Backpacks against Hunger, our UCC special offerings, Heifer International, and our local food pantries (to name a few) it occurs to me that we are sending our love out into the world like a boomerang, instead of playing a game of catch with it. We can't possibly meet everyone who is benefiting from our gifts; we can't see all the hidden healing work that our gifts make possible; we won't get "paid back" by all the souls whose lives are made a little better by our loving acts of generosity. Yet because we choose to send

our love out in this way, a little more love has been shown and known...regardless of whether it ever comes back to us.

I don't remember what ever happened to my childhood boomerang—whether I lost it on a tree, or broke it in frustration because it wouldn't come back to me. Sometimes our love is like that, too—we lose sight of it, or we give up on it in frustration. Yet it's good to remember that Jesus never gave up on love, and it's good to remember that as we throw our boomerangs of love out into the world, we keep good company...

For the greatest boomerang of love was not thrown by humans but by God, when God sent Jesus into the world to offer a better way of life: an invitation to become part of God's endless outreach of love. That boomerang thrown by God 2000 years ago in a Roman-occupied province in the Middle East was a real risk with no guaranteed returns...but that act of love is still reaping blessings in the life of the world--and Jesus has indeed returned to God! May we all be blessed by the grace of that life-changing and world-changing love, and may we join God in throwing our boomerangs of love into the world with full and open hearts!

### Adult Education begins Sunday, September 17, 9 a.m.

Summer is over, and our Adult Education class will resume meeting in the multi-purpose room in the lower level of the church, beginning September 17 at 9:00am. Our first topic will be a study of our current national defense budget and its military, political, economic, and moral/theological ramifications. Currently the U.S. has budgeted \$816.7 billion for defense spending in 2023, and the 2024 Defense budget of \$826.45 billion in new discretionary spending has been approved by the Appropriations Committee. Defense spending is 12% of the total U.S budget, and about 50 % of our discretionary spending, competing with health, environment, education, transportation, housing, justice, and social services for discretionary spending dollars. Yet defense

spending is also at a historical low of just under 3 % or our Gross Domestic Product, a downward trend that has been going on since 2010. Meanwhile, the U.S. is expected to post a \$1.4 Trillion dollar deficit for 2023. So how needed is our current level of defense spending? How efficient is our military apparatus, and does it meet the defense needs of our country? Are we overspending on our defense, when the threats to our national security are analyzed in relation to our ability to successfully defend ourselves? What economic benefits are we experiencing in relation to our defense spending? What political benefits are we deriving from our defense apparatus? And what are the moral and theological implications of such levels of spending, especially when we consider what else defense dollars could fund? As Christians, how do we understand the need for defense weighed against the call to renounce violence and "render no man evil for evil"? Join us in the lower level for an informative look at current state of our nation's defense and the "treasure" we offer on the altar of national security.

# Rice Meal Bag Assembly September 16 On Saturday, September 16, church and community members will gather at the Van Diest building at the Hamilton County Fairgrounds to pack 9,600 rice/protein/nutrient meal bags—enough to feed 57,600 people worldwide! To do this Asbury has been raising funds and recruiting volunteers, and on Saturday, teams of 8-10 people will assemble

for 2 hour shifts to pack the meals. There is a sign-up sheet in fellowship hall for this event; let's see if we can't get enough volunteers to field a team for this humanitarian project! There will be treats for all workers, and a lunch will be served at noon. And if you cannot stand for 2 hours, there will be "sit-down" jobs for you to do as well! The deadline to sign up is September 8.

So here is our plea and plan. We are inviting members to create something that can be auctioned off during a Sunday in Advent with the funds raised going to the organization identified.
